Learning St John skills through competition

St John ambulance cadet teams gathered in Marton at Rangitikei College on Saturday to enhance their first aid and caring skills through competition.

The cadets covered the spectrum of St John youth age groups, from learners to more skilled teens. They came from Feilding Palmerston North, Whanganui and Marton to compete in programmes covering First Aid, Caregivers and Communications.

The event is set up by local St John youth organiser Alison Ehlers and is held twice a year.

St John district youth manager Steve Lancaster says, "It"s very good of the Marton St John group to host and organise this event. It 's extremely valuable, as it's also when our cadets qualify for the regional competitions in Wellington."

The cadets compete in groups of four and in pairs and cover three disciplines - all in front of several judges. The cadets are confronted with scenarios that challenge them to make decisions about first aid and they learn to ask questions of patients in distress and they also have to exercise their communication skills.

It's a demanding but interesting day for the youngsters but they also have a bit of fun along the way.

Check out Rangitikei heritage this weekend

For those with an Historical interest or those just wanting a day out, go along to this year's Rangitikei Heritage Weekend - when all five Rangitikei museums will be open Saturday and Sunday May 18 and 19.

The Rangitikei Heritage Group is made up of representatives of all five of the Rangitkei museums (Bulls, Marton, Hunterville, Mangaweka, and Taihape), plus associated members from Turakina, the Waiouru National Army Museum, and members of the Whanganui Regional Heritage Trust. The group has been meeting for around 11 years.

Rangitikei Heritage Weekend was developed by the group to celebrate local progress since the early days of settlement until today. The date is the weekend that falls closest to the date when the Deed of Purchase was signed and the first of the Rangitikei blocks were made available for purchase, back on the 18 May 1849.

The districts museums will have some interesting displays and will offer unique amusements for younger and older visitors alike. Also on offer, is a competition. Anyone who visits two or more of the districts museums over the weekend, can enter to win a limited edition, full colour, A2 sized printed canvas of sporting personalities of the past. To enter, you can collect an entry form from any one of the museums when you visit, fill in a few details and drop it in to the entry box at any other museum in the district during the Heritage Weekend. Entry at any museum open for the weekend is - free for kids - adults - a gold coin donation. Hours: 10am to 3pm daily.

played live, which have made her sought after by entertainers such as the late, great Sir Howard Morrison, who enjoyed her ability to spontaneously follow his often unrehearsed lead. Vicki subsequently toured the country with him on several occasions, as well as to international functions in Las Vegas, Samoa and Hamilton Island.

She has also had the privilege of working with and accompanying Dame Malvina Major on many occasions.

Vicki was also an essential member of the group "String of Pearls" featuring herself, Cyndi Joe and Mirie Murray. This band enjoyed huge popularity from the early 1990s through to 2006.

During that time, the trio became a duo with Vicki and Cyndi perfroming at

many prestigious conferences and functions nationwide. Their popularity remains strong to this day, with several reunion concerts performed and more planned. Vicki and Cyndi can take credit for the first ever bi-lingual version of the NZ National Anthem, which was performed in Palmerston North at a rugby league international game.

Vicki graduated from Massey University with a Bachelor of Arts, majoring in music, having studied in her spare time, while performing in a solo capacity and occasionally with friend and fellow entertainer Karl Perigo.

Vicki teaches piano from home, using the Simply Music method, which advocates playing as the best way to learn to read music.

Teachers vote for joint strike on 29 May

Primary and secondary teachers across NZ have voted overwhelmingly in favour of taking joint strike action on 29 May, NZEI Te Riu Roa and the Post Primary Teachers' Association (PPTA) has announced. Primary principals also voted in favour of the strike. Primary teachers and principals voted in secret ballots at meetings across the country over the last week, while in the same period, the PPTA held an online ballot of secondary school teachers. The joint strike will see the largest ever industrial action by NZ teachers, covering almost 50,000 members across the two unions. The unions are calling for a day of action for the future of education on 29 May and are encouraging parents and the public to join them at public events

NZEI Te Riu Roa president Lynda Stuart says teachers are raising their voices to say they need the government to prioritise and address the education crisis. "Giving teachers time to teach and to lead, and ensuring teaching is a viable long-term career choice, is essential, if children are to get the teaching and learning they deserve,"



Two Rangitikei buildings win architecture awards

Two heritage buildings in Rangitikei along with some in Palmerston North, Stratford and Whanganui and buildings that support New Plymouth's energy industry have been recognised in the 2019 Western Architecture Awards.

Nga Tawa Diocesan's main school building (1925) in Marton has received an Enduring Architecture award. At just shy of 100 years old, the building designed by WF Higgins Architect has housed many generations of students.

"It has a strong and clear form," said the jury. "The robust materials of the building's construction have lasted well to provide generations of students with memorable, homely spaces."

Taihape's AB Studio, by Copeland Associates Architects, received a Small Project Award. The Taihape building is a "delightful, cleverly designed compact studi, positioned on an elevated site to take advantage of views and light", the jury said.

"The building footprint is small, but the sense of volume created through double-height space is impressive."

The jury gave Architecture HDT a Hospitality award for the skilful design of Little Savanna, a restaurant and bar within a Palmerston North heritage building that is now a "local attention grabber."

The Awards, which were announced at an event in New Plymouth recently, are part of the nationwide NZ Architecture

Awards programme run by the NZ Institute of Architects (NZIA) and supported by paint manufacturer, Resene.

Through the awards, the NZIA aims to demonstrate the contribution of high-quality architecture to the development of New Zealand's cities, towns and communities.

Eleven projects received awards, after shortlisted entries were visited by a jury convened by New Plymouth architect Ian Spiers which included New Plymouth architect Scott Ferguson, New Plymouth designer Trudie Hudson and Wellington architect John Bannatyne.

Celebrating proud Marton squash history

At Easter the Rangitikei Squash Club celebrated 50 years. A number of current and past members started off the celebrations by playing matches, while others joined in the celebrations at the bar.

The first meeting of the Marton Squash Rackets Club was in 1968. In 1969 the courts were built by T & J McIlwaine for \$21,976. A third court was added in 1980. The stairs were shifted and the lounge extended in 1990. About five years ago the bathrooms were upgraded.


50th celebration organiser Di Tasker says, "In 1980, the club closed the membership at 420 and there were 200 people playing in its leagues. Today there are 70 to 80 people playing in the weekly leagues.

"While we are really proud of this, and other clubs in the district are envious of us, it certainly doesn't

come near the 200 that we had in the 80s.

"We are fortunate to have such deep roots. Of the eleven people on the anniversary organising committee, five were life members of the club. A further four life members were at the celebrations and the remaining two surviving life members put in their apologies. Our life members are: John Williams, Lindsay Hunt, Peter Saywell, David McDougall, Don Clark, Peter Death, Merv Tapp, Jim Mant, Alan Bee, Di Tasker, Brent Peacock (deceased) and David Gordon.

Over the years we have produced two national champions. Merv Tapp became a Masters Champion in 1991 and Josh Greenfield a Junior Champion in 2002.




