Chloe attended an international school with ties to London's world-renowned Guildhall of Speech and Drama. This opened up her world to work in TV and professional theatre. Chloe also loved writing. Her poetry was regularly published in Hong Kong's literary magazines, giving her philosophical side an outlet.

She went on to major in Philosophy and English at the University of Auckland, followed by her post-graduate teaching diploma in Drama, English and Media Studies. Although she taught for two years, she was eager to challenge herself and see where her talents could lead her.

Chloe found herself in the media and entertainment world for the next fifteen years which included roles such as creative director and on-air host at popular Auckland radio station George FM, voice-over artist, celebrity voice trainer, stunt-fighter and storyliner and scriptwriter for TV series, Shortland Street.

After marrying acclaimed musician, Michael Franklin-Browne, life remained a hectic mix of media and music. "I was a big city girl, I didn't think I would ever want peace and quiet but then we had children," says Chloe. The family relocated to Michael's hometown of Whanganui. Local schools tried to lure her back into teaching. Last year, she accepted a short-term contract before realising firstly, that she needed to train and secondly, that she really wanted to become a teacher again.

Chloe says, "Learning, thinking, performance, communicating – nothing combines my favourite things like teaching does," On the day of her graduation from a teacher education refresher programme, she accepted a permanent position as Drama teacher at Rangitikei College at the beginning of this year.

"My colleagues and I are so dedicated to our students learning as well as our own. It feels so different to how teaching felt the first time around. This time it feels like we are in it together,"

Petrol taxes

How very sad I feel, that as of November 2018 - the wonderful loyal, friendly and most helpful staff at Marton NW Fuel are to be replaced with faceless automated fuel pumps as a cost saving measure. No thank you!

Did you know that every single day - our greedy NZ govt now steals ... 69.98 cents fuel tax on every single litre of 91 / 95 octane fuel sold right across NZ ...with Auckland motorists being robbed even more. In 2017, this govt overfilled its coffers by collecting \$1.9 billion in fuel taxes alone from motorists and then had the cheek to grab GST on each and every total fuel sale as well.

Surely motorists have already paid their vehicle registrations and Road User Charges to use and help maintain our NZ roads and highways - and it's city motorists benefitting at our rural expense. Live Stronger for Longer

WDHB director of nursing and falls prevention expert Sandy Blake says she can't impress enough how important it is for older people to remain active.



Mrs Blake is urging older people to get involved in community strength and balance classes to reduce their risk of falls and fractures which, inevitably, will have a serious impact on their quality of life. For some years now, Mrs Blake and the Whanganui DHB have been strong supporters of a local effort to provide access to approved community-based group strength and balance classes for older adults across the Whanganui, Rangitikei, Waimarino and Taihape areas.

Exercise providers who meet the nine evidence-based clinical assessment criteria for community-based strength and balance classes are eligible to use the ACC quality 'tick' which people are

encouraged to look for, when making enquiries. Strength and balance classes have been established around the Whanganui, Rangitikei, Waimarino

and Taihape areas. Details of classes can be found at www. livestronger.org.nz and WDHB's website www.wdhb.org.nz.

As a general guide, classes cost between \$3 and \$10.

Classes are for anyone over 60, who wants to maintain, regain or improve their strength and balance. They suit a range of abilities and ages — whether you are 60 or older you will benefit from attending. The classes also include some gentle exercise to music to help improve core strength, fun activities to improve balance, and stretches

to help with lexibility. You need to wear comfortable clothes that you can move in, and flat, comfortable shoes, is the only pre-requisite.

The instructor will be able to adapt the exercises to make them easier or harder to suit the participant.







He says a lot of people are sitting in older, colder houses or older, earlier 20th century houses. Those houses don't have good insulation or double glazing and are generally a lot bigger than they want or need. They have outgrown them but there has not been any alternative and nowhere to go. "We are trying to get people out of their large, dark homes with unmanageable grounds, into a new cosy house, specially designed for them with modern lighting and heating, an easy to use kitchen and they can be wheelchair friendly, with no steps or ramps."

Pukepapa Homes has worked with well-known Palmerston North designer, Keith Webby, to design several options - one has two bedrooms and the other has 2 bedrooms and a study or hobby room. They can tweak the homes to suit peoples individual needs and the homes are all completely low maintenance. The other benefit is that the homes are also suitable for a couple starting out in house ownership. They can afford to buy one of this style of home which is easily adaptable to them and then move to a larger home as their needs change

Pukepapa Homes is building one of the homes in Marton right now, as a show home, so people can see what they are purchasing. It is for sale on completion and then another two homes will be built on the same site in Pukepapa Road.

Gary says, "We have assembled a team of good quality tradesmen who we have worked with over the years. Our first Marton project is in Pukepapa Rd. The frames are up and roof is on so anyone interested, can go and see the progress for themselves. They are small (two bedrooms) but very flexible designs with a great living area and spacious bedrooms. We have also bought land on the corner of Maunder and Signal Sts where

we will provide two more homes.'

"This is the first time we have built our homes in Marton. The good thing about Marton is it is on a real rise. Palmerston North and Feilding prices have shot up hugely. In Marton, we can still build a brand new home at a reasonable price. How long it is going to last, I don't know. The biggest thing is securing good sites. We love the village atmosphere of Marton and we are now seeing that others are recognising that this is a great little town, well serviced with good shops and community facilities - all in a small area. We see good things happening here."

They have tried to build on properties close to town- close to shops, council, cafes and doctors. The homes are turnkey properties - you purchase the completed package with driveways, paths and lawns all done.

"A lot of people prefer to develop their own gardens. You can just move in, with no concerns about having to finish anything," says Gary.

"The best idea is to decide to purchase one early enough in the process." That way, you can choose the type of brick and interior décor. They are very easy to personalise to your own taste.

"We are trying to use local companies as much as possible. If a local tradesman thinks they could offer us their skills, we would be happy to talk to them. We want to put as much as we can back into the local community.

"Our market is all over the country, as well as this region and in Marton. There has been nothing to retire into, so we are tapping into the need for baby boomers to downsize. The homes are cheaper to run and safe. If people already have land, we can also build a house to one of our house plans on their property.

Focus on farming and the land



Keep safe with chemicals

With the warming spring weather, it's time for Kiwis to spend time in their gardens for the season ahead and to be careful.

"Time also to consider what chemicals to use and how you plan see on DairyNZ's board," says Anthony. to manage the risks from the chemicals around your home, "says Lizzie Wilson, from the EPA Safer Homes programme.

"A common home gardening myth is that 'natural', 'organic', AGM.' and 'environmentally friendly' products are safer to use. These substances can still be hazardous and the same precautions, need to be taken, like wearing gloves," says Ms Wilson. Here's some tips to stay safe around chemicals:

- •Weed killers, pest sprays, fertilisers and other gardening products are considered hazardous substances. Take extra care when using, storing, and disposing of these, to protect yourself, others and the environment.
- •If you are spraying near or on edible plants, check the label to see how long you need to wait before the plant or vegetable
- •If you are concerned about using garden chemicals, you can opt to wear glove and check the label to see if you need other protection, like a facemask or safety glasses.
 - Keep products away from your eyes and face and off your skin.
 - Choose a calm day. The wind can blow products into your eyes and face or onto other people.
 - Spray carefully, if you are working near streams or other water. Many garden products should not be used near water.
 - Never pour leftover product down storm water drains.

Outside the Box

Family Relationships

School is back but during the holidays, families were out of

How do we keep family relationships positive during stressful times, with bored children around? For many households, family relationships sometimes feel like riding a roller coaster; with more lows than highs. Negative communication patterns matter. They cause irreparable damage to relationships.

John Gottman studied the relationships of couples in depth and could predict the breakdown of relationships with 82% accuracy if the "the four horsemen of the apocalypse' were present in a single discussion: Criticism, Contempt, Defensiveness, and Stonewalling. And without effective repair after a negative discussion, he could predict relationship breakdown with 96% accuracy.

Where do we start if we want to make a change to negative relationship patterns?

It starts with the adults in the family. We know that our children learn communication patterns from us. If we use the "four horsemen" in our adult communication, we are modelling destructive behaviour to our children. We should not be surprised when the children start using these patterns with us and their siblings.

It is not always possible to be wise in the use of our words, especially in heated moments. However, maybe more importantly, are we modelling the repair of these relationships? It might be worth thinking about what we teach our children; even when we think theyre not noticing.






