Turf project off

A plan to build a new, full size, all weather sports and hockey turf at Nga Tawa School is off but funds raised, will go to hockey in Rangititkei.

Nga Tawa Diocesan Trust Board says it recently received a feasibility report which was commissioned before applying for significant amounts of funding for the project.

They say, "This report was not favourable and did not take into account the demographic of our community or accessibility to hockey for the children in our local community. The report was based on the same model used for strategic planning for sport. The members of the Turf Development Memorandum of Understanding met as a result of this report and have decided to halt the project."

The Turf Development MOU group includes local community, RDC and school representatives.

The board says, "The Nga Tawa Diocesan Trust Board want to assure the community that the funds raised by The Turf Ball remain in the Parents and Friends Association account on term deposit. The Board is committed to these funds being used for hockey in the Rangitikei. The Board made this commitment in writing to the Turf Ball Committee after the funds were raised. "The Board is meeting this week and then will consult regarding the future with the Rangitikei hockey community.

Runners- asked to wear Fluro on dark nights

Runners and walkers out and about on rural roads need to wear Fluro gear or lights to make themselves more visible to motorists - as we head into the shortest day and dark winter nights.

It seems to be especially a problem between Marton and Turakina where an accident almost occurred recently. Drivers are complaining to police and this newspaper, about near misses. They can't see runners wearing black or dark clothing who are running precariously close to traffic. Drivers say they are concentrating on head lights and don't see foot traffic. Dark nights and bright lights render people invisible.

Although it is not illegal to run without Fluro gear or lights, it is very dangerous in the dark.

Anyone who is out running or walking near dark or after dark, is urged to be safe and be seen and wear as much Fluro gear as possible. Otherwise an alternative, off road, winter running track would be a better alternative.

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On Saturday June 8, I spent a most enjoyable day being challenged, entertained and inspired by a group of young people from our electorate. A couple of months ago my Rangitikei Youth MP William Wood, who is a year 13 student at Palmerston North Boys High School, suggested he was keen to start a youth advisory group. his idea was to get a bunch of young people together from time to time, to talk about the issues that are important to them because he feels strongly that young people should be spoken with, not just spoken for.

As part of his vision for the day, William identified that rather than just highlighting a whole lot of problems and concerns – he was also keen that they turn the problems into solutions, by concluding the day with a strategies workshop and some proposed actions.

According to William "Our generation often identify problems but we rarely have an opportunity to propose solutions for youth in our community and for our community in general." It was a great proposal and I was happy to provide my office as a place for them to meet, and delighted to be a part of the day's proceedings. They were a fine bunch, all school students who were enthusiastic and ready to engage.

Robyn Duncan, who works at Manchester House Social Services in Feilding was the guest speaker and initiated a discussion highlighting some of the real human problems she sees in the community. Through her eyes, the group got some insight into the devastation caused to individuals, families and the wider community by the prolific use and abuse of methamphetamine and synthetic cannabis. According to Robyn, meth use is more prevalent than cannabis – though she pointed out that as she sees it, the biggest killer of peoples' hopes and dreams is actually alcohol and that's legal.

Over the course of the day a lot of issues were covered and discussed. Everything from foster care and the role of Oranga Tamariki, to free trade and the environment. There was quite a lot said about the education system and in particular, the pros and cons of the NCEA structure. A conversation about climate change morphed into talk about the number of kids who are driven to school each day - primarily because their parents and caregivers are concerned about their safety. It's too dangerous to walk – even more risky to ride a bike. The group suggested that perhaps our local councils could be doing more by creating cycleways and walking paths to facilitate a safe and environmentally friendly trip to school. This would have significant social, environmental and health benefits. I have to say; at this stage, I liked the way they were thinking.

All in all the Youth Forum was a great initiative. A bipartisan gathering with plenty of productive conversation and a thought provoking speaker. I was particularly impressed that this group of young people wanted more than just a talkfest. The final part of their day was spent discussing possible strategies to effect change - and then putting those strategies into a youth declaration.

William's official duties as the Rangitikei Youth MP get underway in mid-July in Wellington. In the meantime, it's great to have such an engaged and passionate young person to represent me. I am delighted he has developed a way to engage other young people in the parliamentary process and I look forward to helping to facilitate more of these gatherings in the future.

FROM THE PULPIT

A few weeks ago, I was standing at "Ground Zero." Our visit to the 9/11 Museum, built on the site of the former World Trade Centre, was both overwhelming and haunting.

Two magnificent towers, standing proudly over the skyline in the commercial heart of New York, in a matter of hours became a mass of rubble and twisted metal. What was supposed to be a testament to the achievements of mankind and a centre for communication and understanding became the site of death and heartbreak.

It was haunting to walk along wall after wall of pictures, of the people who died that day. Each picture had that person's story. There were a wide variety of folks, from all walks of life. Different faiths, different ethnicities - different people, much the same as you would find in any community - in places like Marton.

There were people who like barbecues, sports, hiking and running marathons. There were accountants, firefighters, lawyers and police.

We all remember where we were when we heard the news on September 11th 2001. We all agreed that the world would never be the same again. Anyone who can compare going through airport security before and after those events will testify to that!

Like the Christchurch shootings and other terrorist events, it was senseless and brutal - carried out by people who thought they could change the world for the better but of course it had the opposite effect.

We live in a world that proclaims it wants peace but seems totally unable to achieve that goal. We rightly ask: "can there ever be peace?"

Jesus talked about a very different kind of peace in John 14: 27. Jesus said, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid." What peace was Jesus talking about? He was talking about peace with God. How do we find peace with God? Only through Jesus. Earlier in the same chapter Jesus said, "I am the way, the truth and the life. No-one comes to the Father (that is God) except through me." When we have that peace, Paul says in Philippians 4:7 that it will "guard our hearts and minds in Jesus Christ." Are you looking for peace - peace with God, that is? Then, Jesus is standing, arms wide open - waiting for you to come.

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

WARM up to WINTER These local business can help with your winter needs

Warm up with thermals

When it comes to being outside in winter conditions, consider adding thermal items to your wardrobe. Thermal clothing is designed to trap the body's heat and prevent the cold air from getting to vour



skin. Besides regulating your body's temperature, this type of garment is also designed to absorb perspiration. Even though the weather may be cold, the simple act of you moving your body for along time, can make you sweat. Designed to fit your body tightly, under your regular clothes, thermal clothing is comfortable and effective.

Heating your home

World Health Organisation guidelines recommend a minimum temperature of 18°C in houses or higher for more vulnerable groups, like children, the elderly and people who are ill. This

recommendation applies to all occupied rooms in your house. When choosing heating for your home, you should consider the amount of heating you need, upfront and running costs and environmental impacts of the different heating options.

How you use a room, will help you to decide which type of heater that's most suitable. For larger rooms, that you want to heat regularly, like a living room, it's worth paying more upfront, for a fixed heating with lower running costs and more heat output. It could be a modern wood or wood-pellet burner, an energy efficient heat pump, or a flued gas heater.

Portable electric heaters may be enough for smaller rooms and rooms

you only heat occasionally, like bedrooms - they're cheap to buy but more expensive to run. Electric heaters may be enough for smaller rooms and rooms you only heat

occasionally, like bedrooms. Before looking at heating options, sort out your insulation. Adding it means you'll be able to use a smaller heating system and your home will be cheaper and easier to heat. Avoid unflued gas heaters (with pipes fixed to the walls or portable) which release toxic fumes and moisture and open fires which are draughty and inefficient.

Match the size of your heater to the space you want to heat. An

oversized or undersized heater will struggle to heat your room effectively and can cost more to run. Ask your heating supplier for advice about what size heater will suit your needs.

Running costs can vary a lot

depending on your fuel price and how well you use and maintain your heating appliance.

It is important to choose the most efficient model for the job, then use and maintain your heater properly.



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Generators for the Home

There are a number of things to consider when choosing a generator that's right for your home. Most importantly, you'll need to know the power requirements of the equipment you might want to run.

The main things you need to consider are:

1. Power output

There are two main power measurements for generators: start-up watts (also known as peak power) and running watts. When choosing a generator, you'll need to choose one that can handle the start-up wattage of the equipment you're planning to power. As a rule of thumb, the start-up wattage is generally around 2-3 times the running wattage of a device. This varies however, and your best bet is to check the manual of the device you're planning to power.

2. Fuel type - petrol or diesel?

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Most portable generators run on petrol, but it's worth looking at diesel models as well. Diesel engines are generally harder to start and are a little bit more expensive than petrol. But they last longer, especially with continuous use. For larger models diesel is going to be cheaper to run due to lower fuel costs

3. Backup (stationary) or portable?

If you're looking for backup household power, portability won't be a priority. Stationary generators have numerous advantages. They're generally quieter, easier to start and more powerful than portable options. Plus if they're hardwired into your home there will be no mucking around with extension cords when the power is out.

4. Traditional or Inverter?

Inverter technology makes these models perfect for powering sensitive electronics like computers, TVs, microwaves, etc. They produce a clean sine wave of electricity, which guarantees there will be no power surges. Standard / traditional generators run at full speed regardless of how much power you need. But an inverter uses a self-governing smart throttle, which adjusts when you turn on a light or appliance. This means you save on fue, it's quiet, runs smoothly and is better for the environment.

How colds are spread

There are over 200 different viruses that can cause colds. These viruses spread through the air when someone with a cold sneezes or coughs. You may also catch a cold by handling objects that were touched by someone with a cold. You're more likely to get a cold if you:

Are tired, or emotionally or physically stressed. Toon't have a healthy diet. Are a smoker (or exposed to second-hand smoke). Live or work in crowded conditions.

People tend to get fewer colds as they get older because they build up immunity to some of the viruses that can cause colds.

You can help prevent the spread of colds by the following - turning away from others and using tissues when you cough or sneeze. Wash your hands after coughing, sneezing or blowing your nose. Wash your hands often and especially before touching food, dishes, glasses and cutlery. Use paper towels in bathrooms Don't let your nose or mouth touch public telephones or drinking fountains.

a cold... avoid close contact with people who have a cold. Eeep your hands away from your nose and mouth. Wash your hands often, especially after coming in contact with someone who has a cold. Eat a healthy diet. Get plenty of rest and don't smoke.

thought of double glazing?

Once you've insulated your ceiling, floors and walls, the next biggest culprit for heat loss in the home is the windows. Double glazing can make a big difference to comfort levels in your home by helping reduce; heat loss, condensation on the glass and heating and cooling costs. The investment will be worthwhile – a warmer, healthier, quieter home with lower power bills. Speak with your builder, designer or window supplier about the best options. It is worth considering retrofitting double glazing by replacing existing windows with double glazed ones, or by fitting secondary glazing to existing windows. Prioritise your spending by concentrating on south facing windows first - these get very little sun, so lose far more heat than they gain. There is a range of glazing options available. Some keep heat inside your home, others keep heat, noise, light and glare out.



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Dam good planting



The view from one of Marton's dams at Tutaenui, where, last week, about 10 keen planters gathered to begin a regime of planting thousands of native trees.

"Rangitikei District Council was successful in its application to Matariki Tu Rākau for funding to supply over 20,000 plants the majority to be planted around the Marton A and B Dams during winter 2019.

The 54-ha site is located adjacent to lower Makuhou Rd near Marton and is the source of drinking water for Marton township.

Ben Woolston, RDC environmental parks assistant in charge of the project, says, "We're starting to plant the edges of the dam with native grasses (carex, cyperus, toe toe, flax) as well as native tree species (coprosma, pittosporum, hebe, manuka etc).

This was the first community planting day, with many more to come, with almost 20,000 plants being planted this season.

Outside the Box

Draining away life and love

When couples experience problems that drain the life out of their relationships there are usually common underlying processes. Russ Harris in Act with Love identifies the following five basic processes as: Disconnection, Reactivity, Avoidance, 'Inside-your-mind,' and Neglecting values (acronym DRAIN).

Disconnection is the process of withdrawing from your partner, being cold or closed off, distracted, leading to retaliation. This creates a downward spiral that drains all intimacy and warmth from the relationship.

Reactivity is when both partners respond angrily and negatively in situations with a lack of self-awareness and self-control, acting in ways that suffocate the relationship. It is natural to avoid unpleasant feelings (avoidance). Avoidance occurs by putting stuff into our bodies (food, alcohol, drugs) which eventually cause health and wellbeing problems. We can also distract ourselves endlessly and avoid dealing effectively with problems.

'Inside-your-mind' describes the chatter inside our minds. If someone gets trapped 'inside-the-mind' with the constant feed of criticisms, judgements, and grievances with regard to a partner, it leads to disconnection and reactivity in the relationship.

When a couple neglects their values, they are cut loose from their hearts' deepest desires in the way that they are acting towards each other in their relationship.

All these negative processes can be reversed, firstly by being willing to make changes and by increasing awareness. If you think you need help with DRAIN in your relationship,

An original Marton standard survey map of properties circa 1869. It shows streets and properties between Toia St (south) Russell St and Bond St (north). There is a dot indicating each section. Robert Signal, Richard Morris and Charles Follett agreed to sell 60 acre blocks of land as sections for other settlers. They subdivded on their own account and, as a result, Marton streets line up haphazardly ie: Grev St and Bell St and several branching off High St. Robert Signal was the first to put lots on the market in January 1866. The map was made before

rail had made an impact on the town.


