Celebration marks ferry restoration

A big crowd turned out last Saturday morning for the official celebration of the restoration of the original Scott's ferry, which is now moored permanently on land alongside Parewanui Rd.

The ferry, which was an essential transport link, north and south, from the mid-1800s until 1908, was rescued from the banks of the Whanganui River in 1989, moved to its current location and restored. However, the years and exposure to weather and flooding took their toll and, early last year, a new refurbishment effort was launched. Generous donations of time, money and supplies from the local community have helped the project reach a successful conclusion.


Speakers included local MP and Bulls Museum patron Ian McKelvie, who has strong family links with the area and the ferry, Rangitikei Mayor Andy Watson, David Watt from Heritage New Zealand, Colin Scott, a direct descendant of ferryman Thomas Scott and Geoff Nicholls, who was part of the original rescue and restoration project in 1990.

The Bulls Museum is currently hosting an exhibition about

the history of the ferry and its importance to the area. The ferry last floated in 2004, when it was caught in floodwaters and spent some time swirling around the paddock but it's hoped it will stay high and dry in future.







Rider Linda Third made the first mail delivery to the Scott's ferry in more than 100 years on Saturday. She presented a mail bag to Kevin Ellery, president of the Bulls Museum and one of the movers of the restoration effort, who was dressed for the occasion. Dignitaries arrived in vintage cars and period costume.

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Kirkin' o'Tartan service features top piper

St Andrew's Turakina Presbyterian Church is holding its Kirkin' o' the Tartan service on Sunday October 14 at 2pm and invites everyone who enjoys wearing the tartan, is of Scottish descent, or who loves the culture, to attend. This Kirkin' o' the Tartan tradition was started by the Rev. Peter Marshall in New York in the 1940s; raising funds for the British war relief during World War 2. The Rev Marshall was originally from Coatbridge in Scotland.

Stories abound of the Kirkin's roots being in the days of the British Act of

Proscription when the wearing of the kilt were banned in the Highlands and small pieces of tartan were brought to church to be secretly blessed - so, in fact, it is a centuries old Scottish tradition. Bring out your piece of tartan and join us in Turakina. This year's piper is Callum Cameron.

Callum began learning the pipes in 2005, under the tuition of Marion Horsburgh, at Scots College in Wellington, where he played for the Scots College Pipe Band, until leaving high school. At the end of 2008, Callum joined the Manawatu Scottish Society Pipe Band and, after a season with them in 2009-2010, he took a two-year break and moved to Christchurch to study. In 2012, while still based in the South, Callum continued to play with Manawatu for the NZ National Championships in 2012, 2013 and 2014. At the end of the 2014 season, he joined the Canterbury Caledonian Society Pipe Band and spent three seasons with Canterbury Caledonian – two with their Grade 2 band and one with the then NZ Champions in Grade 1. Today, Callum's involvement with piping continues through his work on the committee for the Highland Piping Society of Canterbury, renowned for its annual Silver Chanter solo piping competition, and as a member of the Scottish Society of NZ Pipe Band which has just returned from the 2018 World Pipe Band Championships in Glasgow; placed a very respectable 7th in the world in Grade 3A.

Te Awhina adopts student's breathing tool

Te Awhina – Whanganui District Health Board's acute mental health and addictions service nursing staff have adopted a breathing technique used by a second-year UCOL nursing student to help calm a Te Awhina patient who was experiencing extreme anxiety

Student Leah Akkerman heard about the Box Breathing Technique tool from a friend serving in the NZ Air Force. Developed by an American navy SEAL, the technique was found to be very effective when people in the services were facing stressful

When mental health and addictions services clinical nurse educator Pauline Humm-Johnson saw Ms Akkerman using the technique tool with a client, she asked if she would consider developing easyto-follow instructions that Te Awhina staff could carry on their lanyards and patients could refer to when they are feeling anxious. Mrs Humm-Johnson says while Te Awhina staff had used breathing techniques to help clients manage their anxiety, none had seen the Box Breathing Technique tool in use and they liked what they saw.

Ms Akkerman says one of the things she likes about the technique is that it's easy to practise away from work and at any time. "The second time I used the technique with a Te Awhina patient, it was just as successful as the first time. My UCOL tutor Helena Keyes has been very supportive of me developing this work with Te Awhina.'

Making every week Mental Health Awareness Week

Whanganui DHB is supporting Mental Health Awareness Week 2018 by encouraging people to do something every week of the year to look after their mental wellbeing.

This year's Mental Health Awareness Week (Oct 8 - Oct 13) theme encourages people to 'Let nature in, strengthen your wellbeing - Mā te taiao kia whakapakari tōu oranga.

Whanganui DHB health promoter Sarah Hawken says getting in touch with nature is an ideal way for people to lift their

spirits on a daily basis.

"WDHB is keen to see its community take time over the week to enhance mental health and wellbeing and embrace the theme 'Let nature in'. However, we also want to stress that you don't have to wait until October each year to make mental wellbeing your priority. Every week should be a mental health awareness week." Miss Hawken says youth mental wellbeing is a particularly important area of focus for them.

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"Last year, an asessment report pointed to adolescent mental health as a significant problem in Whanganui region. Some people working on the frontline of mental health services noticed a large increase in the number of young people with mental health problems. Additionally, youth were reporting mental health issues much younger than they were before," Miss Hawken says. "This shows how important it is to start promoting mental wellbeing early in children's lives, so they can learn resilience. They can then apply these skills later in life." AT THE COUNCIL RANGITIKES

The September Council meeting started with a presentation by Josephine Renata from Ratana. The Ratana community wants to rebuild their rundown playground and recreation area and was asking for support from Council to get the project kickstarted. Council have asked staff to report on the project to the next Assets and Infrastructure meeting.

The Representation Review is underway, with submissions closing last month. The Review proposes changing from the current five wards to just three – North, Central and South. Turakina Community Committee opposes the change, on the basis that the smaller communities in the District would lose their voice at the table. It was announced that a block of the Council-owned land in Kensington Road is being sold to Graeme Skou.

There was discussion about future of the Bulls Library building, which will become surplus once the new Bulls Community Centre is built. While some councillors favour it becoming a green space, while retaining the war memorial facade, others are strongly opposed to demolition and believe the entire building is a war memorial that should be retained and used for other purposes.

Once the Bulls Community Centre is built, other properties will become surplus – the current town hall, the bus depot and information centre, and the High St toilets and Plunket rooms. These are likely to be sold, and it was decided that price would not be the entire deciding factor - nonprice criteria, such as what the purchaser plans to do with the properties will also be factored in to any sale decisions.

Confusion reigned during discussion about applications to the Community Initiatives Fund. After it was reinforced that applications for capital works or buying equipment were ineligible, Council approved an application for purchasing picnic tables. It was then pointed out that tables were equipment and so, were ineligible for funding.

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Emergency river control works undertaken on Rangitikei River

Horizons Regional Council is undertaking emergency river management works on the Rangitikei River, downstream of Bulls. Horizons in chrge of river management, Ramon Strong says the works will help keep the river in its current channel, protecting

downstream habitat, property and the stopbank that keeps the wider area from flooding.

"The last few winters have seen prolonged periods of high flows in the Rangitikei River and that's taken its toll. The river is close to cutting a new course over several kilometres, putting the full river flow hard up against the stopbank," he

"Should this happen, it will not only cause significant environmental impacts but also compromise the stopbank and consequently the standard of flood protection afforded to the adjoining community."

Mr Strong says Horizons will undertake a range of works to limit the likelihood of the river adopting a new course.

"We have been keeping an eye on this part of the river for some time; high flows and poor ground conditions have limited our ability to intervene until now.

"Council's Catchment Operations Committee has approved additional expenditure of \$300,000 to address this and other issues that the winter has exacerbated, being clear that further funding may well be required later in the year."

By gum: tiny wasp to protect mighty eucalyptus

The Environmental Protection Authority is considering an application to release a parasitoid wasp to control the eucalyptus tortoise beetle

Scion, the Crown Research Institute focused on research, science and technological development for the forestry and timber industries, has lodged the application.

"The Australian eucalyptus tortoise beetle causes significant damage to susceptible species of eucalypts.

Its larvae feed voraciously on eucalyptus leaves for three weeks before pupating. Adult female beetles (pictured) also feed heavily as they develop," says EPA's GM of hazardous substances and new organisms, Dr Fiona Thomson-Carter.

"According to the applicant, the beetle costs the forest industry \$1.0 -\$2.6 million a year in chemical control costs. It estimates that effective biocontrol could prevent \$7.2 million in annual losses caused by impaired tree growth and yield, attributable to the eucalyptus tortoise beetle."

Farm foresters and owners of moderately-sized eucalyptus plantations can't afford aerial spraying, so biocontrol is their

> only realistic option to combat damage done by the beetle."Eucalyptus trees are grown in NZ as a source of products such as woodchips for paper and cardboard manufacture, lumber and durable poles which do not require preservative treatment," Dr Thomson-Carter says

> "Around 90 percent of tortoise beetle larvae survive into adulthood. But if a larva is attacked just once by the parasitoid wasp, survival drops to just 10 percent."

> The wasp is harmless to humans and NZ has no native beetles of the same type

Dental Month

They did come across many lovely flowers, including lady slipper orchids and wonderful blue gentians, growing wild as the land was left to flower and seed before the grasses were made into winter feed. Chris finished by showing pictures and video of her climbing a rock face, which had the audience holding their breath. We thank them for a most interesting talk.

Marching club organiser Sue Webber says,

"The Marton club has been very fortunate to have had very dedicated, talented and competent coaches, great chaperones who always looked after the marchers and uniforms, along with many supportive parents, over the years.

"The marchers have always had great support from the businesses and community of Marton, which they have always represented with pride.

"We invite supporters and former marchers to join us at our Broadway Marching Day, 11am, Saturday 13 October at the Nga Tawa Event Centre. We will also have the Marton & District Pipe Band and the Scoti Dance highland group showing us what they can do."



The Broadway Marching Club has a rich history of marching being founded in Marton in 1948 - just after the sport began in New Zealand during the WW2 when groups of women got together from various business houses for fun and fitness. This early, grainy photo is believed to be Marton's first Broadway Marching Club team. It is hoped one of its orginal members, now aged 92 years, will attend the celebration.



From the late 1940s to the early 1970s, the Broadway team was coached and chaperoned by Marton couple Jack and Myrtle Dickson, for over 25 years. During this time they won many champion team, leader and uniform awards. Jack and Myrtle were both very well respected within NZ Marching and the wider community. Mr Dickson will also be remembered for selling the blue Broadway Marching weekly raffles in local establishments.



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

"Tell us what you want" - kerbside recycling and rubbish collection in residential areas

In the Consultation Document for the 2018-28 Long Term Plan the topic of a kerbside recycling and/or a kerbside rubbish and recycling service was proposed, but Council considered the submissions did not provide a sufficiently strong mandate. So a more intensive publicity campaign is about to start, with every residential urban household being given the chance to tell us what they want. The campaign will outline what is being proposed and the likely costs. Once all the results have been received Council will consider them and make a decision by the end of the year.

Representation Review

11 submissions were received on Council's initial proposal, which was to change from a five ward structure to a three ward structure (effective combining Hunterville with Marton; and Turakina with Bulls). There was one oral submission at Council's meeting last week, from the Turakina Community Committee, opposing Council's proposal. On 18 October, Council will formally consider submissions and decide its final proposal. If there are any appeals or objections to the final proposal, they will be considered by the Local Government Commission (not the Council).

Sale of Bulls Information Centre, Bulls **Town Hall and Bulls Plunket site**

At its last meeting, Council gave consideration to the weighting of non-financial considerations in selling the Bulls Information centre, Bulls Town Hall and the Bulls Plunket site to help fund the new Bulls Community Centre. These considerations are matters such as the intended use of the site, sustainability of investment, and how much the purchaser is already involved in the Rangitikei. Council decided the percentage weighting for the non-financial considerations will be 30%.

Future development of Bulls Library site

The facilities and services currently provided by the Library in High Street, Bulls will transfer to the new Bulls Community Centre, once it has been built. The Bulls Town Centre Plan envisaged this area (including the carpark behind the library on Criterion Street) would become a green space, preserving (at least) the war memorial elements of the Library. This is a topic which will be of interest to all Bulls residents. Council has agreed to establish a steering committee to consider options for the site for Council's consideration along with ways to engage the Bulls community. Heritage New Zealand has the Library listed as a category 2 historic place.

Annual surveys of residents and stakeholders

The results of the surveys completed earlier this year were considered by Council Committees during their September meetings. While generally showing satisfaction, survey respondents detailed a range of services and facilities which they thought could be improved. The relevant activity managers have developed improvement plans for the Committees to consider, progress with these will be reported to the Committees at their March 2019 meetings.

Marton Civic Centre

The quest for external funding for a business case on options at the Cobbler/Davenport/Abraham, and Williams site continues. Those options are: building an entirely new facility; retaining all structures and refurbishing; or retaining facades only and a new build behind these. A parallel project is a heritage feasibility precinct study for Marton's CBD.

Community Initiatives Fund

This year Council delegated decisions to the four Community Committees and two Community Boards. However, there were four applicants whose projects related to all parts of the District, so Council decided to consider these itself. No funding was granted to these. With the amount of funding requested being higher than what is available, the criteria for the Fund will be observed more strictly.
