Last day for long serving policeman

Allan Wright was packing up his desk last Wednesday, on his last day in the NZ Police force after 43 years service. Allan joined the police force 43 years ago, training in 1974 -75 at Trentham, with 76 other eager recruits and, after serving elsewhere, eventually arrived in Marton in January 1992. Before arriving to take up his post in Marton, he had worked at Auckland Central, Auckland International Airport and was in the serious crime unit for eight years, specialising in electronic surveillance, based in Auckland but serving all around the country.

For the first three years in Marton, Allan carried out general police duties, then in 1995, he became a youth aid, community constable. In 1999, NZ Police dropped the community side of his job and he became Police Education Officer - visiting primary and secondary schools throughout lower Rangitikei. He enjoyed informing kids in a range of programmes, including road safety, social responsibility and the antibullying (Kia Kaha) programme.

He says Marton attracted him because he was familiar with the town, thanks to his father's banking career which meant his family lived in the area. So, when a position came up, he applied and was successful. He and wife Wendy bought a rural property and the family settled in comfortably - in time for his young kids to start school. It was so comfortable the couple never left. Allan says Marton still suits him and his wife "just fine". He says, "We have no intention of leaving the area." Allan enjoys trout fishing and is an active member of the Marton Target Shooting Club, so he's not going anywhere. Allan displays a police long service bar and attached stars on his chest. It indicates he is one of very few four star police officers in the country; an exclusive group, each member of which has more than 40 years service in NZ Police. He jokingly says, "I'm a four star general now." But those four stars are well earned awards. He is the longest serving policeman in the Marton station and says, "I only stayed on to see how they would fit the fourth star on the bar but I won't stay for the fifth one.

"I may still do the odd bit of police work after retirement. I still have a few work related things I want to do and I plan



to go fishing and complete a few things around the house. I have already used up the last seven months of my long service leave but I still have lots to do at home."

Always known as the policemen with a beard, now he has long hair to match. - ready for retirement.

Marton based Police Education Officer, Allan Wright has retired, after 43 years service to NZ Police. Until last Wednesday, he was the longest serving police officer in the Marton Police Station and one of an exclusive group of long serving officers in the country. He intends to retire in the community he knows so well.

Businesses open during Broadway works

Rangitikei District Council has advised major work is being undertaken in Broadway, in Marton, from the Follett St roundabout to Signal St. Parking and traffic is being affected. There will be a Stop/Go system put in place from now on, to keep traffic moving. As work is finished outside businesses parking will be reinstated.

While this work is being done these businesses remain open: Cronin Wells Ltd, Z Energy, Centennial Dairy, John Turkington's offices, Creative Courtyard, Local Liquor, St Stephen's Church and walkway, Lounge Café, St Andrews Church and hall, Wally's Books, Eastern Ocean Takeaways, Marton Outdoor Power, Leader and Watt, Remax Real Estate, MSD, Go Ahead Hair, Twiss Solicitors and Kelly Associates, BNZ, Cobham Plumbing, Hopping Auto Electrical, Ward Furniture, ANZ, Marton Optometrist, Alf Downs, Paper Plus Pop Up.

Stage 1 was revised, due to bad weather and alignment of work with telcos. It covers Broadway between the BNZ (excluding the roundabout) and Signal St and involves replacing the watermains and kerb and channel; and resurfacing of the footpath. This is the largest part of the project and the most disruptive and will be completed before Christmas. After Christmas the work involves the commission of the watermain on

the west side; replacement of kerbs and stormwater piping, install feeder watermains and connect to laterals in the footpaths and finally install ultrafast broadband ducting. Stage 2, in Hammond St, is complete.

Stage 3 work will start in February/March 2018 at the Follett St.

Council asks businesses to encourage staff not to park their cars in all day parks outside affected businesses and leave them available for customers. Parks are available a block away.

Whanganui issues mumps warning

Whanganui has had three confirmed cases of mumps – two adults and one child - who have been notified to the Public Health centre.

Whanganui medical officer of health Patrick O'Connor says more than 900 cases of mumps have now been notified across NZ with most in Auckland and most in the 15 to 24 age group. Mumps is caused by a virus which can spread when an infected person coughs or sneezes, or passes it on through their saliva when kissing or sharing food and drink. Antibiotics will not treat the infection or prevent spread.

Dr O'Connor says the usual early signs are fever and headache. After about two days, salivary glands on one or both sides of the jaw, may become swollen and sore. Males after puberty, may experience pain and swelling of the testicles and some females may experience pain in their ovaries. Brain inflammation and one-sided deafness are rare complications. "A person with mumps is considered infectious from two days before the facial swelling, until five days after," Dr O'Connor says. "Anyone with these symptoms is asked to stay away from other people for five days after the swelling.

"If another person is infected, it will usually take 16-18 days until the person becomes unwell but this incubation period can be 12-25 days.

"If someone is unwell with swelling on the side of their face, they should isolate themselves and contact their doctor, who can check for mumps by swabbing saliva on the inside of the cheek. If you are seeing your doctor for this reason, it helps to phone ahead, as this reduces the chance of infecting someone else."

Dr O'Connor says the best protection against mumps is the MMR (measles, mumps, rubella) vaccine. Children have

this vaccine at age 15 months and 4 years. Anyone in NZ born since 1969, is entitled to two free doses of MMR vaccine. Those most at risk in the present outbreak are aged 15-24 years. You can check with your doctor if you are unsure whether you have had the two doses.

Time to fix historic Scott's Ferry barge



The historic Scott's Ferry barge sits on the roadside, on protected land, just outside the coastal village of the Scott's Ferry, west of Bulls – the site of the former Port of Rangitikei (1850).

It is a reminder of times past when there were no bridges over the Rangitikei River and ferries played an important part in New Zealand's history. Tom Scott set up the ferry at the mouth of the Rangitikei River, to ferry colonial settlers across the river for their journey into the Rangitikei and to Whanganui. He was the postman for Bulls and Tutaenui (Marton) areas, as far north as Pourewa.

It's 27 years since the barge's restoration, when a group decided to save it for posterity. Now, because of its exposure to the weather, it's in need of another refurbishment; at a cost of about \$7000.

The Bulls Museum has undertaken to raise the necessary funds for this work to proceed and the RDC has already allocated \$2000 toward it.

Heritage NZ is fully supportive as the restored Scott's Ferry site is a class 1 historic classification.

If you want to help with a donation towards the project-leave it at the Bulls Museum in High St.

Baskets in Broadway all year

Marton Lions are hanging about the flowers again this year. Peter Crawford (pictured below) was busy hanging new baskets recently - to add to those already decorating Broadway.

At their last meeting, Rangitikei District Council generously decided to provide some extra annual financial help taking their annual donation to the project to \$2670 at their meeting last week to help to keep the baskets hanging in Broadway all year round.

The lower Broadway area featuring baskets was extended from the BNZ to the St Andrew's church carpark increasing the total number to 120 baskets.

Lions will have to replant them twice a year with plants to suit the current season- they have only been hung in the spring/summer months in the past but the effect is so complementary to Broadway that Lions want to maintain them all year. The group added a self-watering system on a timer, a few years ago, which also has to be maintained but the big job is growing



All Blacks wear NZ's RSA poppy on sleeve in Armistice Day test

For the first time, the All Blacks will wear the Returned and Services Association's NZ poppy on the sleeve of the All Blacks jersey when the team takes the field on Armistice Day against France in Paris on Saturday.

November 11 marks the days that the guns fell silent on the Western Front in 1918, signalling the end of WW1. As well as wearing the RSA poppy on their sleeve, an All Blacks contingent will also pay its respects at a rekindling of the eternal flame ceremony at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier at the Arc de Triomphe in Paris on Wednesday evening (French time). RSA President BJ Clark says Armistice Day is a day of great historical significance, solemnity and remembrance throughout the world, particularly in Europe.

Armistice Day is commemorated every year on November 11 to mark the armistice signed between the allies of WW I and Germany, for the cessation' of hostilities on the Western Front. This took effect at eleven o'clock in the morning - the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month of 1918. As a result, a service and a period of silence is typically observed at 11am. November 11 is also recognised as Remembrance Day and Veterans Day in some countries. In NZ, wreath-laying ceremonies mark Armistice Day at the national War Memorial in Wellington and at many local war memorials throughout NZ.

Kiwis think they're great drivers, so why do many feel unsafe?

More than a third of New Zealanders feel unsafe while driving and most don't have confidence in the ability of other motorists.

An AA Driving School survey has found that, during seven days of driving, 85% of survey respondents saw other motorists exceed the speed limit, 64% saw motorists drift out of a lane, or park inconsiderately and 63% say they saw someone run a red light.

AA Driving School general manager, Roger Venn says this perception, being reported by New Zealand motorists, points to an incredible level of potentially lazy and dangerous driving taking place on our roads.

"One of the main reasons for the lack of confidence in other's abilities, is people claiming to see plenty of motorists ignoring basic road rules and road courtesies. "If that's the case, there is a real need for better education and enforcement of some of these driving basics," he says.

Almost 3000 AA members responded to a survey on whether New Zealanders thought of themselves as considerate drivers and how the purpose of their driving affected their behaviour.

It found that New Zealand motorists were more likely to point the finger at others, than recognise any of their own driving slip-ups.

"There's a definite disconnect between the number of people driving badly and those taking ownership for it," Mr Venn says.

"If we were all driving as well as we think we are, then confidence levels on the road would be a lot higher."

AA members rated feeling safe on the road and being aware of other road users, as the two

most important factors when driving, ahead of getting to a destination on time, or being courteous to other road users.

"The survey also shows we need to do a lot more work when it comes to being courteous on

The survey also shows we need to do a lot more work when it comes to being courteous on the road. We found that, of the courtesies you can show while driving, motorists appreciate being thanked with a wave, or similar gesture the most. The problem is not enough of us are doing it, or seeing it."

Mr Venn says a large part of improving driving on the road, is to change the way we think about it.

"Driving is like any other skill - you need to put in the time and refresh your knowledge; to ensure you're not letting bad habits stick.

"We know experienced drivers struggle to consistently indicate, check blind spots, do mirror checks and avoid tailgate or distraction from phones - these are all bad habits that have crept into people's driving routines."

Mr Venn says the only way to recognise your own bad habits, is to have someone hold up a mirror and tell you. "Often that ends up being young people doing professional lessons, who then go home to mum and dad and call them out on the things they're doing wrong. "A simulated, on road test, which replicates a driving test, or other types of professional driver training, can also help motorists recognise and then work on the weaknesses in their skillset."
