Trans Tasman equestrian exchange

Nga Tawa Diocesan School hosted some of Australia's best secondary school horse riders last week, when New England Girls' School (NEGS) arrived for a reciprocal Australia - New Zealand exchange.

Earlier in August, a Nga Tawa contingent flew to Australia to compete against NEGS in Armidale, New South Wales. It was the first ever international competition for Nga Tawa but the NEGs team has competed in Malaysia.

The teams consisted of four dressage riders and four showjumpers. Each school hosted the other for a week and the riders went head-to-head in the showjumping and dressage arenas. The visiting team rode on borrowed mounts.

After a day's competition on Saturday, the New England Girls' School team came out on top. They also won the Australian leg.

Nga Tawa Director of Equestrian Libby Rayner says, "The exchange between schools was a huge success. We built a good relationship and have ideas to build on. NEGS won both encounters. Their team was more experienced but our Nga Tawa team will learn from the experience and be ready the next time they compete."

The Nga Tawa exchange received extensive media coverage in Australia, with Libby Rayner appearing in TV interviews.

Gill is from a rural background and came up with the idea, as many schools are not having pet day anymore. "Taihape is a rural stronghold and animals are at the heart of our industry, so it's a great way to celebrate our country culture" she says.

The idea of holding it at the museum was a group idea, including the Taihape Community Development Trust and Museum volunteers. "Every child that entered an animal won a prize, so everyone was a winner.

Stand out crowd favourites included 2.5 year old Bianca Bond, who won the Look a Like competition with her lamb Black Foot (both dressed as Little Red Riding Hood) and the two young Deighton girls, who their own a homemade lemonade stall, also won top prizes for their lop-eared rabbits as well. Skyla-Breeze Stoney won best looking standard rabbit with eleven month old Honey.

Frankie the Donkey also became a star alongside Taihape Vets. Other guests included "Versatile Equines and Farmyard Friends" with Nicky and Piper the ponies, and Bonnie the sheep. Tarata Fishways brought three show standard dachshunds, Silky chickens and two goats.

Volunteers from TAS blew up balloons, put up bunting, signs and helped set up and clean up. Also, two Elders; young missionaries from Idaho, in NZ for two years, helped all day. Binu Manosh a local Indian lady from Kerala, who's village was badly affected by the recent floods, came to raise funds with authentic Indian food, which sold-out almost immediately. Rangitikei College goes fees-free for Y9s

Rangitikei College in Marton is taking the initiative to help put the 'free' back into New Zealand's free education system. Our district's major college is not afraid to break the mould when it comes to supporting its students and families, having just announced it will go fees-free for all Year 9 students in 2019.

Although a handful of primary schools in the region opted for a fees-free regime in 2018, local secondary schools have been slower to offer it. Rangitikei College is now leading the way, scrapping all aspects of its school fees for next year's first-year students.

"We're very conscious of the burden school and sports fees place on our families," says college principal, Tony Booker. "As a school, we've been looking at ways to relieve this stress and decided that removing all fees was the best place to start."

From next year, families of all Year 9 students will not have to pay any voluntary school donations, or special subject costs or sports fees. "The different components of a school's fees can really add up – sometimes up to hundreds of dollars a year if your child is playing a sport" said Booker. "We're really keen to help remove any barriers that are stopping our students trying out, or playing, a sport they love. We've a part to play too in inspiring our kids to 'get moving'. Often playing a sport can be just too far out of financial reach for many families."

The school is really trying to make a difference in the family budgets of its community said Booker. "Although families will still have uniform costs to cover, digital devices are not compulsory at this school, and the Rangitikei College Trust already covers all Year 9 stationery costs. We hope that by adding in our plan to scrap all school fees, prospective parents will feel a little more positive about the looming new school year. And that we can get more young people engaged in a sporting activity without worrying about the cost."

Although scrapping fees will have a financial implication for the school, this can be managed said Booker. Starting by removing fees for just Year 9 students will allow the College to manage the impact. "I expect the conversation around the need to remove all school fees to continue and we hope to lead the way on this, as we start to see the benefits to our students and families kick in. We want our school life to be as welcoming and as easy to join into as we can make it."

Fatality following Whangaehu crash

On Sunday a 23 year old man died following a two vehicle crash on SH3 at Whangaehu, at around 12.30pm.

The driver of the second vehicle was transported to Whanganui Hospital with moderate injuries.

At the time the road was closed for several hours. Diversions were in place, which added significant time to journeys. Motorists were diverted along Warrengate Rd and No 2 Line, north of the scene, and along Turakina Valley Rd to the south. A woman travelling to Bulls says she did about 90km extra, detouring through Fordell to an intersection that lead to Hunterville and Marton. Police asked her to use the Hunterville bound road through Turakina Valley.

Marton police attended the accident.

Bulls fatality

A pedestrian died following a collision with a vehicle in Bulls early morning. The incident occurred between Brandon Hall Rd and Parewanui Rd about 4.15am. The pedestrian died at the scene.

The Serious Crash Unit is investigating both accidents.

FROM THE PULPIT



Pope Francis has publicly acknowledged the failures of the Roman Catholic Church in dealing with sexual abuse by priests - attacking a "culture of death" and deferential "clericalism" that helps perpetuate evil.

An unprecedented letter from His Holiness Pope Francis to the People of God was issued, after almost a week of mounting pressure, following the publication of an excoriating report into abuse by priests in Pennsylvania.

According to a Vatican official, it is the first time a pope has written to all the world's 1.2 billion Catholics about sexual abuse. But some survivors complained the letter lacked concrete proposals and was "too little, too late".

The letter, published in seven languages, opens with an acknowledgement of suffering endured by children and abuse of power. Francis admits the church has failed to "act in a timely manner" and promises zero tolerance and sanctions. "We have realised that these wounds never disappear and that they require us, forcefully, to condemn these atrocities and join forces in uprooting this culture of death," he said.

He added: "It is essential that we, as a church, be able to acknowledge and condemn, with sorrow and shame, the atrocities perpetrated by consecrated persons, clerics and all those entrusted with the mission of watching over and caring for those most vulnerable. Let us beg forgiveness for our own sins and the sins of others."

The letter did not propose any specific measures, or sanctions, against bishops who have been found to cover up abuse, or have failed to report it to police, or other authorities.

Peace At Last concert for armistice

You are invited to join the celebrations marking the end of World War 1 at a Combined Choirs concert in Wanganui on 29 Sept held at Wanganui Central Baptist Church in Wicksteed St at 2pm.

Choirs from the Whanganui and Rangitikei area will join together for an afternoon featuring songs and readings from the war and about peace. Choirs are the Wanganui Male Choir, the Lyric Singers, Schola Sacra, Wanganui Community Choir, Arcadian Singers (Taihape) and the Rangitikei Anglican Parish Choir.

Each choir will present its own items and there will also be an opportunity for everyone to sing along to famous WWI songs such as It's A Long, Long Way To Tipperary, Pack Up Your Troubles, Roses of Picardy and the stirring I Vow To Thee, My Country.

There is also a distinctly New Zealand flavour to the concert, which includes some of our most famous New Zealand songs. These were collected and arranged for the WWI Maori soldiers' songbook, including Po Atarau (Now Is The Hour), Pokarekare Ana, and E Pari Ra.

Modern NZ songs will also feature, from the popular style of folk musician Marian Burns' Beautiful Soldier to items by well-known NZ composer Chris Marshall to poetry by Fairburn, and local composer Alan Cruise-Johnston.

Three young instrumentalists will also feature; Wanganui's Gregory Xavier on violin, Marton's Richard Munt on snare drum and Joe Inman (PN) performing a historic cornet solo. A Powerpoint show of historic scenes from the war and Armistice commemorations will run throughout the concert, complemented by celebratory decorations.

Breathe Better this September and improve your lung health

This month is Breathe Better September, which the Whanganui District Health Board is getting behind to raise awareness of respiratory conditions in Aotearoa.

A range of Breathe Better resources - including asthma, better breathing and healthy home checklists - will be made available from GP practices across the Whanganui district, and will also be shared online during the month.

The national campaign encourages people to show their support for better breathing and healthy lungs - and to start thinking about how they can improve their respiratory health.

More than 700,000 people have a respiratory condition, which is the third leading cause of death nationwide at a cost of \$6 billion each year. In Whanganui, there were 1444 respiratory hospitalisations in 2015 alone.

Meanwhile, more than 521,000 New Zealanders take medication for asthma, making it the most common respiratory condition in the country - with a cost of more than \$858 million each year.

By far the highest number of people being admitted to hospital with asthma nationwide are Māori, Pacific peoples and people living in the most deprived areas. Māori are 3.4 times and Pacific peoples 3.9 times more likely to be hospitalised than non-Māori, while people living in the most deprived areas are 3.7 times more likely to be hospitalised than those in the least deprived areas.

Breathe Better September is being led by the NZ Asthma and Respiratory Foundation, and challenges people to improve their fitness and breathing, while helping to create awareness, and fundraising, for New Zealanders living with respiratory conditions.

Last year, participants raised money through self-imposed challenges including walking, biking, meditation and healthy eating.

Fonterra nominations open

Nominations for the 2018 Fonterra Shareholders' Council and Directors' remuneration committee election are open. They close at midday on Thursday, 20 September. This year, elections are being held for Shareholder Councillors in 10 wards including Ward 16 - Central Districts West. They are also in Northern Northland, Waipa, Central Taranaki, Tasman, Marlborough, Waikato West, Northern BOP, Central Canterbury and Western Southland. The council consists of 25 councillors - all Fonterra farmers, elected across 25 wards throughout New Zealand. Nomination papers and candidate handbooks will be available by phoning the Election Helpline on freephone 0800 666 034 or emailing iro@electionz.com. Nominations must be received by the Returning Officer, Warwick Lampp of electionz.com, by 12 noon on Thursday, 20 September.

One month until new animal welfare regulations

New regulations to strengthen our animal welfare system will come into effect on 1 October 2018. Ministry for Primary Industries Director for Animal Health and Welfare, Dr Chris Rodwell, says the 45 new regulations cover a range of species and activities from stock transport and farm husbandry procedures, to companion and working animals like dogs and horses. "With under a month to go, until these new regulations come into effect, we want to encourage people, who are responsible for any type of animal, to check they are up to date in how they are looking after them," says Dr Rodwell. "Our team has been working with industry and sector groups to raise awareness of the regulations and ensure people understand and can meet their responsibilities. "Most New Zealanders already care for their animals well, so if you're already doing the right thing, you won't see a lot of change. "The majority of the regulations reflect existing standards but there are a few that do set new rules and requirements, such as prohibiting the tail docking of cows and dogs. "Even if you already think you are doing the right thing, it's best to check and make sure you are." One of the main changes is that the new regulations will make it easier for MPI and the SPCA to take action against animal mistreatment. "These regulations will allow us to better respond to lower levels of offending and target specific behaviours that need to change. "For example, if people allow their animal's horns to become ingrown, they can be fined \$500. We will continue to prosecute the worst offenders under the Animal Welfare Act." In developing the regulations, current science, good practice and the views of submitters were taken into consideration. McKelvie Memos

MP for Rangitikei



The Wanganui and Rangitikei districts have a rich history in racing, producing many renowned horses and successful people involved in the industry including breeders, trainers, owners and riders.

Sunday night's New Zealand Thoroughbred Horse of the Year Awards in Auckland were a testament to this. Twenty-five awards were presented, and our region was well represented.

Isaac Lupton was named Jumps Jockey of the Year, for the third time. Trainer Raymond Connors' horse Wise Men Say won the Jumper of the Year title; Christopher Grace was nominated for Breeder of the Year, while Aroha Duncan and the late Jim Speedy's horse, Upper Cut, trained by Mark

Oulaghan, was nominated in the Horse of the Year category.

Earlier this month, Hunterville trainer Ken Duncan's horse, Shamal, ridden by Buddy Lammas, took out the 144th running of the Racecourse Hotel & Motor Lodge Grand National Steeplechase (5600m) at Riccarton. Lammas, partnered Shamal to victory in the Manawatu Steeplechase (4000m) at Trentham last month too.

The O'Leary brothers - Dan, Humphrey, Michael and Shaun and their wives have also enjoyed success in their racing enterprise, most recently with their horse Who Shot Thebarman, which has lined up in the prestigious Melbourne Cup four times. Only a couple of weeks ago the champion horse won the Stayer of the Year award at Racing's Night of Champions in Sydney.

Kevin Myers continues to enjoy a long and successful career out of his Turakina training base and is one of New Zealand's most successful trainers, with over 1,150 wins. He is well regarded for his prowess in both jumps and flat racing.

I can claim a long-standing interest in the industry too, having previously served as president of the Rangitikei Racing Club as well as my grandfather and great grandfather before me. I am also National's spokesperson for Racing.

The announcement of \$30 million of contingency funding from the Provincial Growth Fund, which has been earmarked for the racing industry to build up to three all-weather tracks, is being welcomed by many involved. According to New Zealand Thoroughbred Racing chief executive Bernard Saundry, the industry lost nearly \$3 million in the last year - due to abandoned races. Synthetic tracks would go a long way to providing certainty for trainers, owners and jockeys.

Meanwhile, the whole governance structure of the racing industry is currently under review by Australian horse owner John Messara who will provide recommendations to the government on its future direction. His report, which is to be released today, will undoubtedly acknowledge the significant contribution of the industry to the New Zealand economy, while at the same time detailing comprehensive venue reports based on feedback from around the country.

The racing industry employs more than 50,000 people, either directly or indirectly and has an economic impact exceeding \$1.6 billion a year. I am delighted to be in a role where I am able to take an active interest in the future development of an industry that has a proud history and a promising future in the Whanganui and Rangitikei districts.

Rural school bus service review needed

Rural Women NZ is calling for a review of the school bus eligibility criteria, particularly in the rural areas. "The safest way for children to get to school in rural New Zealand is by bus. However, the current eligibility criteria for the service means that children are being put in dangerous situations," says education portfolio convenor and board member, Sue Higgins. "If children live within two kilometres of a rural school, they are not eligible for the local bus service, where there is one, and are forced to walk or cycle on roads with no shoulder, often used by logging trucks, stock trucks and milk tankers, making it treacherous for our children.

"RWNZ understands that parents are responsible for ensuring their children go to school. However, the rural bus is vital for farming families who have a busy working life and distance, for those who live further away, to contend with.

"A review of the criteria applied to children's eligibility for their local rural school bus service is needed - school by school.

"It's time the Government showed leadership on keeping our rural children safe on their journey to and from school," says Mrs Higgins.

Milestone Reached - Bulls Community Centre Project

Last week's Council meeting marked a significant milestone for the Bulls Community Centre project. The Council made the decision to proceed with the construction of the new Centre. This is great news for the Bulls community and the wider District, as well as for the elected members and staff who have been working on this project for the last few years. W&W Construction 2010 Ltd, from Whanganui, have been selected as the preferred contractor. Work will now proceed with finalising the contract for the project. It is hoped that the contractor could be on site in about four weeks. The build time is estimated at 15 months, so this would mean the new Centre could be open in December 2019.

Subdivision of 37 Kensington Road, Marton

Following expressions of interest for this site the Council has agreed to negotiate a sale price with GK Skou Transport in Marton.

Marton-Bulls wastewater upgrade

Last week's Council meeting agreed that establishing a land-based disposal system for the combined Marton and Bulls wastewater flows is Council's preferred position. This means the process to purchase appropriate land disposal areas will start, as will the pipeline design. There will also be further engagement with Iwi and the Bulls/Marton communities before the resource consent application is lodged with Horizons Regional Council before the end of

October 2018. Funding is included in the recently adopted 2018-28 Long Term Plan.

Funding for additional Hunterville toilets

Council received the welcome news from the Minister of Tourism confirming \$75,000 has been allocated for toilets and rubbish facilities at Queen's Park, Hunterville. This is a popular stop-over point for travellers. The funding is expected to cover Enviro toilets, a rubbish compactor and a water bottle refill station.

Mangaweka Village toilets

Council has negotiated a licence to occupy the northern part of the land owned by Papa Cliff Café. It is expected that the completed toilet facilities will be open before the Christmas period.

Taihape Memorial Park

As requested at the community meeting in Taihape on 3 August 2018, Council is currently investigating the cost of a full renovation of the grandstand (including the facilities beneath it) as well as strengthening.

Road safety improvements

Improved signage has been installed at either end of the hill on Kakariki Road. Signs indicating the reduced speed limit on Dixon Way (and the short sections of Otaihape Road and Mangaone Valley Roads which link Dixon Way with SH-1) are now in place.

Representation Review

Council is required by the Local Electoral Act 2001 to undertake a representation review once every six years. This review considers the number of Councillors, the extent to which the District is divided into wards, and the number and coverage of Community Boards. So this review is important for ensuring effective and fair representation of the District's communities. The proposed changes are:

- Reducing the number of wards from 5 to 3.
- Bringing the boundary of the Northern ward south.
- Combining the Marton and Hunterville communities into one ward.
- Combining the Bulls and Western communities into one ward

Submissions close on 17 September. Full details are on Council's website - www.rangitikei.govt.nz. Following consideration of submissions to this initial proposal, Council will issue a final proposal (which may be identical to or different from the initial proposal). If there are appeals or objections to that, they are considered by the Local Government Commission (not the Council) who would make the final decision.

Community Initiatives Fund

The current funding round is now open for applications. This Council funded scheme is open to all initiatives and opportunities which have potential to benefit the District's communities. The maximum amount granted per application is \$2,500. Applications close on 13 September 2018.

The Rangitikei District Council Fair Play trophy was awarded to the Ruapehu Under 11s, for demonstrating true team spirit on the day.

Tim Price Wins Burghley

Tim Price rode the round of his life, to win the Land Rover Burghley Horse Trials in the UK this week. The 39-year-old continued his masterclass effort, with a clear round, aboard Ringwood Sky Boy in the showjumping; to finish on 27.3 penalty points. Five-time Burghley winner Andrew Nicholson put all the pressure in the world on the top four, with his clear round, aboard the very promising Swallow Springs, in their first 4* (experienced international) start, but it wasn't quite enough to add to his trophy cabinet and he finished in third place on 32.1 with Oliver Townend (GBR) aboard 2017 champ Ballaghmor Class second, on 31.9.

Price was also 10th on Bango. Just eight of the remaining 39 combinations managed to go clear and inside time in the showjumping and two of those belonged to Price, who has been in the top five at Burghley, for the past three years, with Ringwood Sky Boy.

It is his second 4* victory - the current world number four ranked rider won Luhmuhlen in Germany aboard Wesko in 2014 - but he has been on the podium in prestigious 4* events at Badminton, Burghley, Kentucky and Pau. It was New Zealand's 14th Burghley crown and 30th 4* title, and it is the third 4* trophy to head to the Price household this season with wife Jonelle winning Badminton and Luhmuhlen.

"I am just so so thrilled," said Price, who described Ringwood Sky Boy as "such a trier - He has always been putting his best hoof forward with everything. I'm really just trying to stay up with the misses! She is a great driving force for both of us - we are lucky to have each other. I am sure we will look back on this in years to come - 2018 has been a very special year."

To win meant "absolutely everything" to the Rio Olympian who also paid tribute to Ringwood Sky Boy's long-standing owner Verenna Allen. "Burghley is the place you want to come to and put your best foot forward. You have got to bring your best game - from a riding point of view, this is where you want to be your best. This is very special - I will always carry it with me."

Jonelle was also very proud of their efforts. "Tim is world class - there is no shadow of a doubt," she said. "They are truly deserving winners. This year is remarkable - I wouldn't have said it was possible at the start of the year but dreams do come true. You have to enjoy these things when they happen - you don't know what is around the corner."

Sir Mark Todd added four faults to his tally, to finish in 18th place on 49.6, rounding off a weekend that didn't quite go his way. "He jumped a really nice round," he said of NZB Campino. "Unfortunately we had just one down. It has been a bit like that all week with him - nearly but not quite in all three phases."

Caroline Powell and On the Brash were 31st and Dan Jocelyn, aboard Dasset Cool Touch, 32nd. Burghley debutante Ginny Thompson decided Star Nouveau had done enough, with such a "beautiful and comfortable" cross country on Sunday and withdrew her from the final phase.

"She was not quite herself and, in her best interest, I decided to withdraw her from Sunday's final phase," said Thompson. "I am just so thrilled - she has given me an experience of a lifetime."

Nicholson also chose not to bring Jet Set IV back for the showjumping and Todd was eliminated during Sunday's cross country, aboard Kiltubrid Rhapsody.
