Artworks tell story of Parihaka

Four prestigious artworks by Rangitikei art students are displayed in the windows of the former Westpac building on the corner of Broadway and Wellington Rd in Marton.

They are displayed so locals can also celebrate the achievements of Level 2 & 3 Arts students at Rangitikei College. The work is based on the story of Parihaka.

Art teacher Vanessa Edwards says, "At the beginning of the year, students were challenged to research the history, effects and relevance of Parihaka.

"Since then, the works were chosen to be exhibited at the Whanganui Community Art Centre alongside that of students from Whanganui High School and Girls' College.

The region's schools are all studying for the same achievement standard; they're doing a similar body of work and it focuses on their interpretation of the events of Parihaka in 1881.

"Art students had to complete research, work out the level of symbolism to incorporate into their work and do a print, a woodcut, or a painting of their ideas.

In 1881, about 1600 government

troops invaded Parihaka, a place which, at the time, symbolised peaceful resistance to the confiscation of Maori land.

Ms Edwards says, "In the past we've done the whale and we've done huia as a subject, but this is the first time we've done something that is more of a political movement for the kids and I was very impressed with the students' ability to delve into the story and interpret the events in visual form.

"Works that stand out are Alison Edwards' "Fatal Impact" and Aaliyah Te Rangi's "Te Tihi O Te Toka Hukapapa."

Students used symbolism to convey their views and were challenged with working on a large scale, to exhibit in a public arena, alongside other students doing the same assessment. The works were then graded and moderated by all teachers involved.

The students are now working on their portfolios to ensure that they achieve NCEA.

She says, "As art students, it felt great, after the hard work we put in, to have our artwork out there. It was an awesome feeling." Now locals can see the quality of the students' work for themselves and read a brief description of its relevance to the 19th century confrontation at Parihaka.

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Papal medal awarded in Taihape

A group of local people gathered for a special service at St Mary's Catholic Church in Taihape on 14 June, to celebrate the awarding of the Benemerenti Medal to Marie Donovan, for her service to the church in Taihape.

Marie, and her sister, Jo, have been assiduous in caring for the altar and vestments used in the church liturgy. A resident of Taihape for all her 90 years, and following the departure of the Josephite Sisters from Taihape, Marie continued their work making sure things were correct for church services in terms of floral decorations and clean linen etc. As a nurse aid in the hospital and her strong involvement in the Floral Society, beautification of the church came naturally and she has made great contributions to the Taihape Community.

The bunches of flowers given to Marie on the day, including one from St Joseph's School, were gratefully and very emotionally received by her.

The Benemerenti Medal is only awarded sparingly; the previous one was to former Taihape Borough mayor and notable local, Noel Byford. The medal is a gold Greek cross depicting Christ, with his hand raised in blessing. On the left arm of the cross is the tiara and crossed keys symbol of the papacy. On the right arm is the coat of arms of the current Pope. It is suspended from a yellow and white ribbon, the colours of the papacy. Originally established as an award to soldiers in the Papal Army, members of the Swiss Guard receive it for three faithful years of service. Awarded by the Pope, it was later extended to the clergy and the laity for service to the church. Fr Bernard O'Donnell of Taihape had written the story of Marie's life in applying for the medal and was asked by Bishop Charles Drennan to present Marie with the medal, with a handwritten citation in Latin. During the service, an Anointing of the Sick and Elderly was provided for those who requested it. The interior of the church was bathed in brilliant sunlight, on an otherwise grey day "The Church continues to amaze people with its architecture and use of natural lighting" said Fr Bernard.

Afternoon tea was served to all following the service.

Community support led to stationery business

After a seven-month trial the Paper Plus 'Pop Up' shop in Broadway Marton has become a victim of its own success and its a continuing good news story.
 Shop manager Sam Marsh says, "The 7-month trial of the 'Pop-Up' stationery and book store had been hugely successful." He says he has been overwhelmed by the support of local businesses and the community, right from the first day. This support has led to the decision to take the next step and open a new store 'One Stop Stationery And Books' as a stand-alone, permanent stationery store, right in the heart of Marton (in the same building).
 The two previous staff, Jan Peacock and Sam will man the new store.
 Sam says, "One of the differences that you will see, will be the newly sealed footpath and lack of orange cones. "The new store is expected to be up and running in the next few weeks, but first there are a few i's to dot and t's to cross in the background
 "Once again, thanks to the local community and businesses for their support during this changeover period," says Sam.

\$11m for economic development welcomed

Manawatū-Whanganui regional leaders have welcomed Forestry and Regional Economic Development Minister Shane Jones' announcement of almost \$1 million towards planting in the Horizons region and a \$10 million loan to Ruapehu Alpine Lifts Ltd for the construction of a high-speed gondola on the Whakapapa ski field from government's Provincial Growth Fund (PGF).
 Horizons Regional Council chair and Accelerate25 lead team member, Bruce Gordon says the announcements will make a significant contribution to the mānuka, land optimisation, and tourism - visitor services opportunities identified in the Manawatū-Whanganui Economic Action Plan as well as provide environmental benefits to the region.
 "Investment in planting approximately 1.35 million trees into forestry, made up of over 800,000 mānuka plants, with the rest being predominately radiata pine seedlings and alternative species, creates more than just jobs and revenue streams - planting in our hill country protects farm land from erosion and improves water quality by reducing sediment in rivers," says Mr Gordon.
 "Over 1,000 hectares of erosion-prone farm land will be planted throughout the region by the end of September 2018. "We are appreciative of central government's funding towards this winter's planting ahead of the One Billion Trees programme due to be finalised next year.
 Ruapehu Mayor Don Cameron says the \$10 million loan to Ruapehu Alpine Lifts Ltd for the construction of a high-speed gondola on Mt Ruapehu is fantastic.
 "This investment captures the excitement and promise of tourism development and what it can deliver for the region and NZ's economic future and will enable the \$25 million project to be completed in time for next year's ski season," says Mr Cameron.
 "The new alpine lift is estimated to attract additional half a million visitors to our district by 2025, boosting regional tourism, employment and investor confidence for developing other iconic visitor experiences, as we grow visitor expenditure to \$400m by 2028.
 "It is rewarding to see the collaborative efforts of our Ruapehu Regional Visitor Development Plan and Accelerate25 coming to fruition. We welcome the formal partnership with central government and local stakeholders."

Mr Gordon says the Minister's announcements are a positive example of how the region has come together to help unlock potential.

"It's important to acknowledge the Provincial Development Unit for making this commitment to our region," he says.

Marton Christian Welfare plans for the future



Recently, Marton Christian Welfare, shared some of its history with the Marton and Rangitikei community in an article. Robert Wilson from Marton Christian Welfare says, "We now want to share the exciting aspects that are in the

process of happening now and in the near future, which we believe will further benefit our community. "In December 2017, with the assistance of an anonymous donation of \$20,000 and two interest free loans from the Marton Rotary Club and E V Calkin Family Trust, Marton Christian Welfare bought the property at 9 Follett St, which is next door to its opportunity shop. "The purpose of the purchase of this new property is to extend the existing Opportunity Shop building, thus producing more storage, sorting and retail areas for all the wonderful donated goods that our community so generously gives us. "This exciting venture will further enhance the benefits Marton Christian Welfare extends into the community to various charitable endeavours, by continuing to donate the income we derive from selling these donated goods . "Just some of the things we currently do are: donations to schools, churches and Red Cross,. We operate a foodbank, assist those in need through the local Budget Services, on request, and as other organisations in the community request assistance, we endeavor to assist them. We also supply Milo to schools for the benefit of pupils. "On 23 June, the house nextdoor, at 9 Follett St will be demolished and removed.

Plans for the extension have been completed and we are in the process of getting these finalised officially, so that we can obtain trade quotes and building consents. "As a means of funding the new extension, Marton Christian Welfare will be applying to different funding groups for assistance. "We hope our community will be as excited as we are, to see this as a necessary and practical venture to further benefit the Marton and Rangitikei District.

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Prepare for winter



Home Generators

Portable generators are a great way to provide power to your home in a power outage. They are portable, relatively easy to use and with increasing innovations, new models are coming out that are quieter, fuel-efficient and lighter in weight. A portable generator not only means you can run your domestic appliances, it also means a real sense of security during and after severe weather events. While it could provide temporary power to run; lighting, heating and electrical appliances in a power outage, one of the top reasons to have a home generator at the ready, is to keep your refrigerator and freezer running smoothly, saving on food spoilage and wastage. Not only is a generator an obvious back up power source for your home, it can be useful in the shed or garden. There could also be instances where a portable generator could be a 'lifesaver' in an emergency. As our planet continues to warm, severe weather events such as storms, flooding etc are expected to increase in regularity, making a portable generator for your home more and more valuable.



Dealing With Coughs and Colds

If you catch a cold, you can expect to be sick for one to two weeks. That doesn't mean you have to be miserable. Besides getting enough rest, these remedies might help you feel better:

Stay hydrated - water, juice, clear broth or warm lemon water with honey helps loosen congestion and prevents dehydration. Avoid alcohol, coffee and caffeinated sodas, which can make dehydration worse. **Rest** - your body needs to heal. **Soothe** a sore throat - a saltwater gargle of 1/4 to 1/2 teaspoon of salt dissolved in a glass of warm water can temporarily relieve a sore or scratchy throat. You can also try ice chips, sore throat sprays, lozenges or hard sweets. **Combat stuffiness** -over-the-counter saline nasal drops and sprays can help relieve stuffiness and congestion. **Relieve pain** - Use appropriate painkillers. Ask your chemist for the correct type and dose for your child's age and weight. Adults can take such things as Panadol, ibuprofen or aspirin. **Sip warm liquids** - a cold remedy used in many cultures, taking in warm liquids, such as chicken soup, tea or warm apple juice, might be soothing and might ease congestion by increasing mucus flow. **Add moisture** - a cool-mist vaporizer or humidifier can add moisture to your home, which might help loosen congestion.

Check Heating in Your Home

Choose the most efficient heating system for the space you want to heat. For larger rooms you want to heat regularly, it's worth paying a bit more upfront for a fixed heater with lower running costs and more heat output than a small electric heater can provide. Electric heaters may be enough for smaller rooms and rooms you only heat occasionally. Choose the most efficient model for the job and use and maintain your heater properly. For example, have heat pumps serviced and regularly clean the filters. Some heat pumps have special sensors which can direct airflow in the room or reduce the heat when you leave.

It's recommended that a safety check of your woodfire be carried out before the start of every winter season and, in the event that your door glass is cracked or broken, it should be replaced immediately. Also, you should check the door seal of your woodfire to ensure a perfect seal at all times. A faulty or worn seal will allow excess air in and make it difficult to regulate air intake.

If the door glass consistently has black patches or streaking near the edges, inspect and if necessary replace the door seal as this indicates it is leaking and drawing air from the room.

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

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
