# New ambulance for Marton St John

There's a new set of lights and sirens in Marton, thanks to the generosity of local Pub Charity businesses.

A shiny, new Generation 3 ambulance, the latest available, replaces the exisiting Marton ambulance. Along with another ambulance destined for Palmerston North, it was dedicated at a small ceremony at the St John base in Marton on Wednesday last week.

There are three Pub Charity businesses in Rangitikei – Cooks Bar in Marton, the Rangitikei Tavern in Bulls and the Gretna Hotel in Taihape and it was funds from the gaming machines in those businesses that paid for the \$185,000 vehicle.

The Marton ambulance service covers a wide area, including SH1 and regularly takes patients to Whanganui and Palmerston North hospitals, so it travels thousands of km every year.

The new vehicle is designed to make it easier and safer for ambulance staff to care for their patients and to make the ride more comfortable for patients. The improvements include a power lift stretcher, so ambulance officers don't have to lift patients. St John has several major fundraising projects coming up, including raising money to build a new ambulance station for Hunterville.

Some Plunket areas of the country were holding a similar cheese roll contest. Moomaa Café just decided to include them too.



## Tertiary reforms could



### dissolve UCOL

Labour's tertiary education reforms will be wider than first thought and will strip power and assets from regional polytechnics like Palmerston North based UCOL, MP for Rangitikei Ian McKelvie

National has obtained a Cabinet paper which outlines the Government's proposed changes. The Government will take this paper to Cabinet on Monday.

"The reforms will mean regional polytechnics will be renamed as subsidiaries of a newly formed statutory entity called NZ Institute of Skills and Technology (NZIST). After two years polytechs and Industry Training Organisations (ITOs) will be dissolved. This is disastrous for regional education and apprenticeships.

"The Government's 'we know best' attitude will mean the organising of apprentices will be taken from industry, who know the needs of the Manawatu best and instead, will be given to one polytech.

"Cash assets and community legacy assets will be ring fenced at the new head office and all other assets will be taken away and consolidated. Current boards will be sacked on day one including local members and will be replaced by a subsidiary board, and regional leadership groups will be advisory only.

"UCOL has served the needs of the Manawatu, Whanganui and Wairarapa regions well for a number of years now and has worked its way through the many challenges the tertiary sector has faced to provide a great service to our broader community. "One of the great risks of this move is to limit our young peoples" access to good local training.

"The Government has said it is committed to the regions. But it is destroying a polytech which is integral to our community. "These reforms are further punishing the Manawatu and are punishing well performing institutions like UCOL," Mr

"This is another case of Wellington telling the regions they know best. Education Minister Chris Hipkins should be addressing the problems where they are and leaving successful institutions like UCOL alone. National will return polytechnic assets taken by Labour and give them back to communities. We will return polytechnic decision making back to communities and the regions. We will return apprentices to the industry. We know how important UCOL is to our broader region and we know what is best for our community. National will fight these reforms. We will fight for regional New Zealand and we will fight against idealistic educational reforms," he says.

## Firearms buy-back event coming to your town?

Federated Farmers is pleased with the number and geographical spread of collection events for semi-automatic firearms prohibited under new legislation.

The Arms (Prohibited Firearms, Magazines and Parts) Amendment Act came into effect on 20 June 2019. The new regulations allow for the buy-back of newly prohibited firearms and parts from owners within a six month amnesty period (by 20 December 2019).

To receive compensation for prohibited firearms you are required to have a valid firearms licence. If you are handing in parts and accessories included in the prohibited list, you do not require a firearms licence to receive compensation.

Details of the guns eligible for the Buy Back Scheme are on the NZ Police website along with how the scheme will work and how much the state is willing to pay for each type of gun. It is listed under the heading of Firearms and Safety.

"Farmers were worried they'd have to travel many miles to turn in and be compensated for these firearms but it appears our concerns have been met," Federated Farmers firearms safety spokesperson Miles Anderson says.

"Only time will tell whether the four hours allocated for the hand-over process in each town and available personnel, is sufficient given the inevitable debates over compensation amounts for various firearms.

"We hope it goes smoothly, and if the allocated resources for the buy-back process do prove insufficient, that the government reacts swiftly," Anderson says.

"The sooner the details of the process, including the number and geographical spread of collection points/events, are clear the better," Anderson says.

"We hope that it will recognise the needs of those who live in our more remote rural locations. The buy-back is likely to be underway at the busiest time of year for farmers. With calving and lambing approaching, the last thing they need at that time of year is a lengthy trip to a major centre to dispose of a firearm."

Farmers still need firearms suitable to undertake pest control. "Many have indicated that they are waiting for compensation to purchase a replacement firearm that is within the new rules," says Anderson.

"Farmers always look to have the most efficient tool for the job. They will be expecting fair compensation to purchase a replacement that is still suitable to control the pest animals on their farm."

Federated Farmers is pleased to see there will be compensation, up to a \$300 limit, for modifications to some firearms to bring them within the legal requirements. "This will address the concerns of some of our members," Anderson says.

### Weekend Study for Early Childhood

People working during the week in the early childhood, home care sector can now study towards a much needed qualification in the weekend.

UCOL Head of School Dr Bridget Percy said there is increasing interest in Early Childhood Education, and in response UCOL has NZ Certificates at Level 3, 4 and a new Diploma at level 5. "We want to also make it possible for people to continue to work as they study. With this in mind, we are offering weekend study options for the NZ Certificate in Early Childhood Education level 4. This involves 17 Saturdays at our Manawatū campus, together with online study and resources, starting on 5 August 2019.

The Government has indicated that in future, a minimum requirement for early childhood home care workers will be a Level 4 qualification, in order for the children in their care to qualify for 20 hours free early childhood funding.

Anyone who is out running or walking near dark or after dark, is urged to be safe and be seen.



### Who are we...

The South Rangitikei Kāhui Āko/Community of Learning is made up of the ten schools listed above. We have worked hard to engage with our ECE centres across the region. We welcome Ruahine Kindergarten Association (Bulls Kindergarten, Follet Street Kindergarten & Mill Street ECE), All About Kids ECE (Marton & Bulls), Marton Junction Community Preschool and Ohakea Day Care to the Kāhui Āko. We are super happy to report that the ECEs have nominated a representative, Kerri Osborne, who will attend all Kāhui Ako hui in a role similar to that of our Within School Teachers. She will represent the voice and position of ECE and allow smoother communication and collaboration between the ECE's and schools. We are thrilled with this progression as we see the ECEs as a vital part of a child's learning journey.

As a group of schools and ECE centres, we believe that together we can improve learning for all our learners by collaborating. By learners, we mean all students, whānau/family, Boards of Trustees, all school staff and the wider community. We all have a vital part to play in the education and well-being of our tamariki/children.

### Kāhui Āko recent events

Twenty staff from all schools recently completed a day's hikoi led by Dr Mike Paki. We visited places of historical significance to Ngāti Apa to increase awareness and knowledge for our staff.

Principals, Within and Across School Teachers, and teachers completed a week of learning in week four. Professional development in PaCT was held at Bulls and Clifton Schools. These Wananga weeks take place week four and eight in each term.

### Achievement challenge 1 explained

The South Rangitikei Kāhui Āko/Community of Learning has three goals which together comprise the achievement challenge.

The first Kāhui Āko goal is:

Challenge 1: Build Teacher and Learner Efficacy. Educational efficacy - a shared belief that through critical and deliberate professional and collective actions, we can positively influence student outcomes. All of us are smarter than one of us. By all schools and ECE collaborating and developing our professional knowledge to empower students to become independent lifelong learners, we will raise the educational achievement of all learners in our schools/kura.

One of the critical aspects of this is ako. Ako is when we engage with each other in on-going learning conversation to help make sense of the learning. All sides benefit from the discussion and learning is relevant, remembered and powerful. Ako is encouraged by listening and speaking respectfully, coaching and mentoring, challenging and empowering all learners.

### Here are three actions schools are currently undertaking -

- By the end of term 2, all ten schools will have used the PaCT tool (Progress & Consistency Tool) on a group of students in either writing or maths. Using PaCT will provide benchmark information for moderation purposes.
- Schools can choose to complete the Wellbeing Surveys, which will provide comparison data for 2018/2019.
- Within School Teachers have the opportunity to gather feedback from individual schools about the influence of the Kāhui Ako on their approach to teaching and learning.

Interschool Athletics was held at Hunterville School late last term. Winter sports are now in full swing.

Emma Slaney, who nominated Libby, said: "She is always helping kids and parents in her spare time. She goes above and beyond all the time, even when she's got tons of other

Libby is Director of Equestrian at Nga Tawa School. She is passionate about making riding as accessible and enjoyable for as many people as possible. She says she has a really supportive team behind her and they are always looking at what they can do, improve or create.

Libby's nomation listed activivities that occurred under her directorship including opning up the Nga Tawa School Pony Club branch up to the public and as a result has a huge

membership now and lots of kids from the Rangitikei joining

She helped create a riding school on the weekends during term time for community members who don't have their own pony, to have the opportunity to ride the Nga Tawa ponies, have lessons and enjoy equestrian.

Libby has run low level, cheap entry, shows and training days to encourage people to come and have a go at show hunter and show jumping. For Nga Tawa equestrian students, She has also created a partnership with an Australian school and the two visit each other for interschool dressage and jumping competitions annually.

Libby also takes a biannual field trip for the whole Nga Tawa Academy (78 girls) to the races to show them the opportunities available to them for a career in the industry. She also overseeas a have a "school pony" programme for girls at the school who want to have the opportunity to ride and compete but don't or can't, own their own pony. They are able to lease one of the 30 school owned horses or ponies.

## Horizons RC takes step forward in intensive land use regulation

At their full council meeting this week, Horizons Regional councillors recommended the notification of Proposed Plan Change 2 (PPC2) to address current issues within the One Plan's nutrient management policy and rule framework.

The proposed plan change seeks to provide a workable framework for intensive land use – allowing a pathway for existing farmers and growers, in target catchments, to apply for resource consent and for the Council to see greater progress towards environmental improvement.

The proposed plan change is focused on existing intensive farming land uses and includes the recalibration of Table 14.2 Cumulative Nitrogen Leaching Maximums (CNLM) with the most up to date version of Overseer.

Horizons chair Bruce Gordon says that while Proposed Plan Change 2 is a tightly scoped change to fix a nutrient management implementation issue, it is a great step forward.

"However, we cannot have our science, knowledge and practice frozen in time," says Cr Gordon.

"Farmers and growers continue to be regulated under the One Plan. This change provides a pathway for farmers applying for a consent outside Table 14.2 – either through demonstrating their proposed nutrient reductions and mitigations, including using Good Management Practice and innovation, or through detailing their transition plan out of intensive land use over

"These changes will provide our officers better mechanisms for assessing applications. However, it does not guarantee a consent will be granted in every case.

"Proposed Plan Change 2 is the first of a number of plan changes and will be complemented by catchment reviews, which involve our communities in planning for freshwater management in our region.

Notification of the Proposed Plan Change 2 will commence on 22 July 2019 and will be followed by an extended consultation period of 60 working days. Once submissions have closed, hearings will be held in 2020.

## Memorial erected to mark Meyer cemetery donation

A memorial recognising a generous donation by pioneer Johann Christian Meyer has been erected at the Mt View Cemetery. In the late 1860s, Johann Meyer donated 2 acres of his Mt View farm, to the Marton township and district, for use as a cemetery.

It was recognised by his descendants, who then decided to created the memorial (pictured) to celebrate the gift and appealed to the RDC for some support for the project.

Descendants and movers of the project, Trevor White, Graeme Meyer and Ian Meyer say, "The memorial has now been put in a prominent position at teh cemetary to gain the public endorsement and acknowledgement of our pioneer ancestor's thoughtfulness and community mindedness in the early days of New Zealand and Rangitikei's development.

"We acknowledge the executive and staff of the Rangitikei District Council's interest and support of this project. Also acknowledged is the assistance and expertise of Marton's Permanite Memorials staff."




