

Family remembers him

On Sunday 4 November, over 60 direct and extended members of the McIntyre family gathered in Ohingaiti to unveil a plaque in remembrance of Sergeant Walter McIntyre; the date marking exactly 100 years to the day that Walter was killed in action - at the battle of Le Quesnoy in WW1 - just one week before the war ended.

Walter McIntyre was born in Hunterville on 29 October 1897. He grew up at Rangiwahia and, after enlisting in Mangaweka, he left for European combat in 1917. He was a corporal in the NZ Rifle Brigade - later promoted to sergeant. He was awarded a Distinguished Conduct Medal and the Military Medal for Bravery.

To commemorate the centenary of Walter's death in battle, his four remaining nephews and nieces, Kirsty Garner, Graeme and Donald McIntyre, Eleanor Bowler, along with younger nephew, John McIntyre, unveiled the commemorative plaque at the McIntyre Reserve in Ohingaiti, where they had earlier planted a tree in their uncle's memory. The extended family had gathered earlier in the day, enjoying a picnic and socialising, while viewing personal and WW1



memorabilia, presented on several display boards in a marquee on site.

The formalities concluded with a poignant reading by Kirsty Garner, of handwritten letters Walter had sent back home from the war zone (a mixture of humour and horror) all both remarkable and emotionally moving. "We will remember him."

From NZ Dog Agility to Shepherds' Shemozzle

Babybelle of Streamlea is my youngest, 'second chance dogs'; a 2-year-old Huntaway-Border Collie. She joined my family a year ago and like all my other 11 'second chance dogs' she didn't have the best start in life. Due to her friendly nature, she settled in quickly and soon became part of the pack. As she is a Huntaway, she is full of beans and all she wanted was a job. Running around on our 15-acre lifestyle block was not enough. We first started with basic obedience, before foundation agility. She absolutely loves it and does it with enthusiasm. Five months down the track and she became part of my competitive agility team. I presently compete in competitive agility competitions with my two heading dog-border collie siblings. At Labour Weekend, Babybelle competed with 500 other dogs from all over the country at the NZ Dog Agility Champs at Manfeild Stadium in Feilding. She did remarkably well, considering the completely new environment, high numbers competing as well as the noise. Belle started in 6 classes and came home with 2 clear round certificates.

As she seemed to be so laid back, I decided to take up the challenge of the Shepherds' Shemozzle. Three days before the race, we received the obstacle course description. We had to do a quick course in how to sit and be wheeled around in a wheel barrow, sit on a fadge which I had to drag along the ground. The other obstacles were either agility or handler focused. Belle was the only dog attached on a lead among 200 huntaways attached on chains. Hmm, we got a few strange looks from the real shepherds, but we were there for the fun, not to win. Off we went, over the truck, up the brutal hill, over the gates (lifting a 25kg dog is not for the faint hearted), through a mud pond, down the hill over gates again, onto the mud slid (my backside still



hurts), over the truck, through water jets, through culverts where Babybelle was patiently waiting until "mum" finally appeared, to the fadge stop, tyre treading, eating, bull ball carrying, over a huge balage pile, through a tractor tyre, another wade through a pool, onto the haybale swing and collar trough and to the final wheel barrow race. We made it! Wet, dirty, me slightly out of breath - we got to the finish line (left). Belle is definitely more talented than her 'mum' but I am very proud to have been able to show to shepherds that a 'townie dog' can do the same madcap thing.

We will remember them at 11.11.11

At 11am on 11.11, centenary Armistice services are being held nationwide and locally to remember the 11th Hour of the 11th Day of the 11th Month 1918, when the guns fell silent on the European Western front to end WW1. The Armistice led to the signing of the Treaty of Versailles in January 1920, confirming the ceasefire.

Marton RSA will form at Marton Park's main entrance on Follett St and march with the Marton Pipe Band, to the Marton WW1 Centotaph in Marton Park, for a wreath laying remembrance service. The Marton fire siren will also sound at 11am. In the afternoon at 2pm the public are invited to an Armistice church service at St Stephen's Anglican Church.



Hunterville RSA is combining its annual luncheon and a commemorative service to recognize 100 years since the 1918 WW1 Armistice on Sunday.

Taihape RSA invites the public to commemorate with a service at St David's Church at 9.30am on Sunday 11 November followed by a dedication at the Taihape town clock memorial from 10.45am.

Bulls RSA will be joined by the public and local school pupils at the Bulls Cenotaph in High St at 10.45am for a short 15-minute service ending with the National Anthem at 11am- then on to a Barbecue at the Bulls RSA Clubrooms.

In Turakina - St Andrews Presbyterian Church Turakina is holding an Armistice Day Service with Rev John Peill on Sunday 11 November at 10am followed by morning tea. When the Armistice was signed, 58,000 NZ troops were still serving overseas including 24,000 on the Western front where some of the bloodiest battles had been fought to finally decide the outcome of WW1, in favour of the Allies.

the hand gel we provide at entry points around the hospital," she says. "What we want to impress on patients, is that they can speak up and ask our staff if they have washed their hands appropriately before touching them. We know this is not easy for people to do, but patients have the right to speak up and we encourage them to exercise that right." Free unlimited public WiFi

Following a short trial, WDHB has announced that unlimited free public WiFi is now available at Whanganui Hospital to allow patients and visitors to connect their mobile devices to the internet, during their time on the hospital campus. Thanks to the generosity of internet service provider InspireNet, the service has expanded to provide an increased data limit from one gigabyte (1GB) free per month to unlimited data. Neighbours at war Approval to use gall mite to curb old man's beard

When neighbours go to war, often it is over trees. Big trees don't respect carefully mapped out section boundaries. They grow free and wide and block views. They restrict light, drop branches in high winds, and drop leaves in gutters and pools. The law says property owners can cut back any branches or roots from neighbouring trees that encroach on their property (at their own cost and without the neighbour's agreement). The big BUT is that they can only do that if it doesn't endanger the health of the tree!

It is generally recommended that you go to the owner of the trees in question, discuss your concern and see if you can work out a solution. Quite often, how you convey the concern will have a big impact on determining the result.

It is always preferable if the two parties can reach an amicable agreement about what to do. The owner of the trees may not even be aware there is a problem. Often, a resolution is achieved when a shared cost deal is worked out between the two parties.

We are not fans of removing large trees but unfortunately some trees outgrow their situation or become unstable and present a danger. If the problem is a shade one, it may be that the tree can be thinned and pruned.

At Beaver Tree Service we are happy to come in and provide advice or help mediate between the two parties, if required.

The leaf-galling mite *Aceria vitalbae* may now be used to combat the pervasive weed old man's beard, following a decision by the Environmental Protection Authority (EPA). Horizons Regional Council applied to the EPA to introduce the gall mite on behalf of the National Biocontrol Collective, comprised of 14 regional councils and the DoC.

"DoC told our decision-making committee that old man's beard is a serious environmental pest, for which there are limited control options, especially where it is widespread," says EPA GM of hazardous substances and new organisms, Dr Fiona Thomson-Carter.

"And Horizons Regional Council submitted that some native plant species, especially in the central North Island, are heavily impacted by old man's beard. It noted that in some places, this weed has been dispersed by the wind and has established on cliffs - cloaking vegetation and, ultimately, killing other plant species."

Horizons spends more than \$500,000 annually trying to eradicate old man's beard and five regional councils around NZ estimate they spend approximately \$760,000 in total.

Aceria vitalbae is a gall-forming mite," explains Dr Thomson-Carter. "The galls it forms on host plants provide shelter for the mites, enabling them to multiply. The plant redirects resources into the galls, which reduces its capacity to flower, produce leaves, grow longer internode stems, and photosynthesise."

While the leaf-galling mite might attack plant species closely related to old man's beard, such as the exotic Clematis stans, Manaaki Whenua Landcare Research told the EPA it is confident there would be no significant damage to non-target plants, such as native Clematis species.

"Overall, the EPA concluded that native NZ plants are not at risk of attack by *Aceria vitalbae*. Spill-over attacks on exotic species within the same clade as old man's beard are very unlikely, as ornamental Clematis and old man's beard do not grow in the same areas," Dr Thomson-Carter said.

"The decision-making committee noted the environmental benefit of reducing herbicide usage if biocontrol proved effective. This would lessen collateral damage on non-target plants and reduce the chemical burden on the environment," she added.

The lambs have been carefully prepared and trained, for many hours, by the school children. Local farmers, Gavin Reeves and Ruth Rainey, were the judges, who had a hard task deciding the placings.

Results: Junior section: 1 Atarua Finn-Wipaki with her lamb, Little Lady; 2 Rebecca Hoyle and lamb Cowgirl. Senior section placegetters were: 1 Cooper King with lamb Juile, 2 Logan Ryder with lamb Pumba. Champion lamb was awarded to Cooper King. Another fun part of the day is the best dressed lamb section, where inventive decorations and clothes are attached to the lambs. Results: 1 Rebecca Hoyle and 2 Logan Ryder.

Indoor sections included exhibits for decorated cupcakes, aqua jar, sand and vaseline saucers, wildflower arrangements, creation of decorative buttonholes and recycled constructions - the latter producing some great examples of creatures and robots made of recycled tin cans and the like. All entries were of a high standard and the difficult job of deciding the placings went to judges Dianne Christie and Nita McChord. Recycled garden sculptures were judged by local artist Richard Aslett, with family entries by the Prip and MacMillan clans celebrating wins, with second place going to the King whanau. The children enjoyed participating in the sandpit treasure-hunt, while back inside, the cake auction was a great success, with funds raised going towards the cost of this year's school camp at Rotorua. School principal Maree Rossiter says, "Another great school event and thanks must go to all the judges, to all our families and our wider community, for the marvellous support shown by them again." The morning wound up with a complimentary barbecue - well appreciated by those who attended.


